Operation Hickory

Team Mike at the Roadblock

As the Commander of Team Mike during Operation Hickory in October 1966, I read with interest the 11th ACVVC Historian’s article “Welcome to Vietnam” in the Blackhorse Hoofbeats section of the 3d Quarter 2014 issue of *Thunder Run*. Operation Hickory was the first major independent operation conducted by the 11th Armored Cavalry after its arrival in Vietnam, and, unfortunately, Team Mike’s experience at the blocked road during the route clearance mission was even a greater fiasco than described. The 11th ACVVC Historian is to be forgiven, however, because, his source for the story was undoubtedly the official after-action report, and official after-action reports, as we all know, are usually written by those who were not present at the event and are approved by those who have an interest in making the action seem, if not heroic, at least competent.

During Operation Hickory, Team Mike consisted of the Headquarters Section and the 3rd Platoon of M Company for a total of

seven tanks, plus two attached ACAV platoons from I Troop and L Troop respectively. Team Mike did not have an AVLB, which was a Squadron asset, attached on this mission. The route clearance operation was in the western portion of the former Long Khanh Province and was supervised from the air by that bane of all ground combat junior officers and NCO’s in the Vietnam War, a field officer in a Command and Control helicopter, in this case the Squadron S3.

Team Mike’s route degenerated from a rather solid dirt road through thin jungle to a narrow trail over a type of causeway through an open swamp which might have been an abandoned rice paddy. About 100 meters into



four times each year. For those of you who have not yet joined as members, this issue will give you an opportunity to catch up on some of the activities of the past year as well as those planned for 2015. We encourage you to take a few minutes and read this magazine cover to cover.

Last year was very busy. On Memorial Day Blackhorse troopers, family and friends gathered at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial to honor our fallen with the annual wreath laying. This has been an annual tradition since 1986. We never forget our fallen.

In July, the 11th Cavalry memorial was moved from Fort Knox to Fort Benning in preparation for the new memorial at the future Armor and Cavalry Museum.

In August, the nineteen (19) scholarship recipients for 2014 were announced. Thanks to the support and generosity of our members for our Scholarship Fundraising projects we were able to award scholarships totaling \$78,000. Eighteen (18) applicants received scholarships of \$4,000 with one receiving \$6,000 and The Chuck Schmidt Leadership Award.

In September we held our annual reunion in Las Vegas where 1,500 troopers and family members attended! This was the third largest reunion in our history. One of the traditions at our reunions is to recognize veterans attending their first reunion. One hundred-eight (108) "first timers" were recognized at the Saturday evening banquet. Welcome home!

Las Vegas also gave us an opportunity to visit our regiment at their home at the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, CA. Over 700 people boarded 14 buses for the day trip. The veterans were welcomed back to their regiment and enjoyed viewing a large display of equipment and vehicles, touring the

museum and watching a demonstration by the horse detachment. At the end of the day the veterans and entire regiment assembled for the impressive photo printed on the back page. No further words are needed to describe this picture.

On Veterans Day, troopers gathered at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial for our annual wreath laying. Also on Veterans Day the groundbreaking ceremony for our new memorial was held in Columbus, GA. Both events were well attended.

We wrapped up 2014 with the mailing of our annual calendar as part of our Scholarship Fundraising project. Members are always eager to get their calendars. The calendar contains 12 photos of "every day life" in Vietnam. There are also many significant dates and historical notations about the regiment's service. We encourage all those who received a calendar to help support the Scholarship Program by making a donation. Even a small donation is helpful. Donations also ensure that we can continue printing and mailing the calendar.

In 2014 we published four outstanding issues of *Thunder Run* with a variety of photos and interesting articles, many submitted by our members. 
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From the 66th Colonel of the Regiment

the swamp, the VC had dug a trench about 10 feet wide and 4 to 6 feet deep, effectively blocking the road over the causeway. The heavy section of 3d Platoon, M Company, was the lead element in the Team Mike column and was able to maneuver one tank over a portion of the trench but could proceed no further without collapsing the causeway. At this point, Mike 6 (unlike the description from the Historian) was quite daunted, realizing that it would be impossible to continue without further problems. The road over the causeway was effectively blocked and too narrow to allow one ACAV to pass another, much less a tank. Likewise, the causeway was too fragile to attempt any work by the dozer tank, so nothing seemed to await Team Mike except to reverse direction.

While the efforts at the breached causeway proceeded, the Squadron S3 circled overhead in his OH-13 ordering “operational updates,” which I grudgingly gave every 15 to 20 minutes. The S3 finally realized that continuing on the road was impossible, but he claimed that he could see from the air that it would be possible to proceed if a tank would leave the causeway and drive to the right of the swamp, hugging its edge. From my position on the ground, this was impossible, and I stated so. After a short exchange, I was informed to stop arguing, not be insubordinate, and do as instructed. In short order, tank number 1 sunk in the mud; I was told to send another tank out on a wider curve to the right. Tank number 2 then sunk in the mud. The VTR, attempting to winch out tank number 2, itself then sunk in the mud.

At this point, the S3, annoyed at my incompetence, had his pilot land the OH-13 and came to take charge of the situation on the ground. On the ground at the head of our column, it was readily apparent that the route was impassable and the road clearance operation at an end. To support Team Mike, Team Kilo had been ordered to follow Team Mike and was now in formation behind us, both units in a modified herringbone formation. The Team Kilo Commander soon joined the S3 and me, and the S3 said he was going to take a look at some further trenches that he had seen from the air near the point that the road re-entered the jungle. This point was some 200 meters in front of where Team Mike’s column had been halted. I posited that this was not a very good idea as we had

no security out at the second trench location and that the causeway could bear no further tracked vehicle traffic. No was the reply; we can walk there. I see it from here. The S3 followed by the Team Kilo Commander and a few engineers took off along the causeway while I frantically had the 3d Platoon Leader dismount a few of his tankers with M3 .45 caliber “grease guns” to act as security walking alongside but not on the causeway. At this time, we had a chronic shortage of caliber .45 ammunition, and each “grease gun” had barely 10 rounds in the magazine. The Platoon Leader of Team Mike’s attached I Troop platoon also scurried back to his unit to organize some dismounted scouts/infantrymen for security.

By this time, the party had reached the farther trenches on the causeway, studied them, and concluded that the route was indeed impassable. As the party was returning to the head of the Team Mike column, there was a loud explosion when the party was about half-way back. I, on the side of the causeway, was about dead even with the large VC-produced Claymore-type mine that exploded; throwing me to the ground and hurling shrapnel and fragments into the party on the causeway. A few desultory bursts of small arms fire seemed to come at us from the jungle in the vicinity of the cut. As I only caught the side blast of the mine, I was stunned but unhurt. I crawled to the edge of the causeway and saw the attached I Troop

Platoon Leader running up with some dismounted troopers and begin firing at the wood line and the ditch along the causeway. This fire was joined by one or two of the tanks which fired machine gun fire into the jungle near the trenches. There was no further hostile activity. Several troopers, including the S3 and the Team Kilo Commander were wounded and quickly “dusted off.” The S3, who had always been a stickler for wearing flak jackets at all times, told me, as I was helping to load him on the evacuation helicopter, that the greatest lesson learned from this operation was to always wear your flak jacket — it undoubtedly saved lives in this instance. Luckily, no one was seriously wounded, and all were returned to duty in a few days.

There was nothing further to do except vehicle recovery operations, and, thanks to the talent of the Company M maintenance section, that went rather rapidly. Three ACAV’s were hooked up in tandem with cable and freed the VTR. Then the three tandem ACAV’s and the VTR, using its winch, freed the two tanks. The Third Squadron Commander with his Command and Control helicopter had joined us during the “Dust Off” and observed a portion of the recovery operation. When he departed, he ordered me to take Team Mike and Team Kilo back to our designated laager position for the night, thus ingloriously ending the road clearance mission.


Are You A Member?


We have an exciting year ahead of us. We have a tremendous organization that has grown from a handful of members 30 years ago to the thousands of members today.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM UPDATE

The 11th ACVVC Scholarship Program has awarded **356 scholarships totaling \$1,126,000** to children of our members and KIAs since its inception in 1996. Every scholarship dollar paid was donated by YOU, the members of this

great association of Blackhorse combat veterans!! You will find a usable copy of the current Scholarship Application in this issue of *Thunder Run* and also on our website.

Our recently updated Scholarship Guide provides more information on the scholarship process and contains detailed assistance on completing the scholarship application. Applicants planning on attending graduate school programs are eligible to apply for a scholarship, however undergraduate applicants will be given preference in the judging process (see #6 below). You can print a copy of the Guide and the Application at www.11thcavnam.com/scholar.html. **If you have a child (natural, step child or adopted) who is planning on attending a college, community college or trade school this fall, please encourage them to apply for a scholarship. Please do not hesitate to contact me with your questions.**

Beginning in 2008, each recipient's Scholarship Award has been dedicated to honor a specific 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Trooper who was Killed in Action (KIA) in Vietnam or Cambodia. The Blackhorse KIAs to be honored each year will be selected on an impartial and random basis. An attractive certificate suitable for framing containing information about the trooper in whose honor their scholarship is dedicated is sent to each recipient.

In addition, each year, one recipient is selected to receive a special **Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Leadership Scholarship** award in honor of former 11th ACVVC President Chuck Schmidt for his leadership and devotion to the 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Troopers of the Vietnam War.

Chuck died on Veterans Day 2007 as a result Agent Orange-related cancer shortly after being elected to his third term as President. Chuck's widow, Mrs. Bonnie Schmidt, selects the recipient of this award from the list of scholarship winners.

Scholarship Judges are asked to rate each applicant on a 30-point system.

1. Up to 7 points may be awarded for Application completion, legibility, and following the instructions on the form and in the Guide

2. Up to 8 points may be awarded for Grades of the Applicants' most recent two years of education (high school or college)

3. Up to 15 points may be awarded for the narrative response to the questions in item #11 of the 11ACVVC Scholarship Application.

4. Each applicant will be judged independently by **each** Judge. Currently we have five participating independent Judges.

5. The Judge's scores are averaged to obtain a final score for each applicant.

6. If some applicants are graduate students, the scholarship chairman shall add 4.0 points to each undergraduate student applicant's score.

The 11th ACVVC Board of Directors will determine the number of Scholarship awards to be granted in any given year based on the available donated funds and the dollar amount determined for each scholarship award. The Scholarship Committee will then apply that number to the list of applicants in descending score order to determine who will receive the Awards. In 2014, we were able to award 19 scholarships totaling \$78,000 to children of our members.

Grandchildren of members are not currently eligible. The criterion to include Grandchildren as eligible for scholarships is reviewed annually.



Reunion Assistance Fund

The purpose of the Reunion Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is to assist Troopers who served with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam and Cambodia, and family members of our troopers killed in action in Vietnam and Cambodia, to attend a reunion sponsored by the 11th ACVVC. Qualified applicants will be given one or more of the following items, depending on the number of requests, funds depletion, and the degree of assistance required:

1. A room at the host hotel for one or two nights during the reunion weekend.
2. Funds to purchase fuel for auto, tickets for airfare or other means of transportation such as bus fare or train fare.
3. Registration fees.
4. Meals or food allowance.

Funds are collected through direct donations by our members and are accounted for by the Treasurer. The Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is a separate reporting account on the 11th ACVVC quarterly financial report.

To be considered for financial assistance from the fund to attend a Reunion of the 11th ACVVC, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as Parents, siblings, children, widows) making the request must...

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and
2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry "Blackhorse" Regiment.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation. In addition, the Trooper may be required to show proof that he is a member, or that he is qualified to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC. The Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC will decide by a majority vote on whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or Survivor of a KIA. **Requests must be submitted no later than to July 18, 2015.**

Her name wasn't Joanne, but that's what we'll call the young woman who came to a reunion a few years ago. She'd been born when her father was in Viet Nam. He was killed in action so she never knew him. She came to the reunion to find someone who knew her dad. She wanted to know him too. She found three troopers who knew him. They were buddies who had served with him on the same track. They were there when her dad was killed. She wanted to know all about him and they told her. Her dad was a real Blackhorse brother and a real hero. She spent the whole reunion with her dad's brothers. Now they were her brothers too.

A motto of our reunions is "Together Then - Together Again." Having reunions is important for the men (and now women) who went, fought, and paid the price demanded for whatever situation they were plunged into. I don't need to remind you of life in Viet Nam. You were together with the men who covered your back, who lived your story as you lived theirs. You bonded under fire - in the bush, in the rear, in training at home or sometimes in another land besides Viet Nam. Serving in uniform meant you were available for whatever our country needed. Same with your buddies. During Viet Nam our country needed you and plenty more. A lot of water has passed under the bridge since. Our lives have changed and come to where we are now. We're a lot older and wiser. We're carrying the memories and lessons learned from the fog and fire of war. We're not the same as we were before and we're not the same as we would have been if we hadn't gone. Most who weren't there don't have a clue what we're talking about. But you do. The brothers you served with do too. Coming to reunions is a way to put your

life then, into perspective with life now; and all the years between.

Look at Joanne's story that we opened with. Her dad's buddies had been getting together at reunions. They kept the bonds between them strong by showing up, by "re-uniting." Then Joanne came. She was looking for someone and found them. They "adopted" her; she gained family, healing, and joy. They gained a sister who shared her dad. This is only one story, one among many. But it shows what happens with "Together Again."

A typical experience happened the year a Blackhorse trooper, Bill, came to a reunion for the first time. He was nervous. Actually, I'd say he was pretty scared. Is that unusual? No. It's not unusual. Most of us are apprehensive about meeting up with brothers after decades apart from the Viet Nam experience (aka, ordeal). Bill was too. I remember him telling me about stepping into the reunion bunker. It's the large room where everyone gathers to visit, tell old stories, and imbibe a little. In other words, to re-unite. Bill looked across the room and spotted one of his best buddies from the old days. His trepidation and fears were quickly broken, old bonds took hold, and "Together Again" set into motion. It was like forty-five years had faded away. Stories from those distant days were told one after another. The years apart meant little, only "Together Again" mattered. Sure,

Bill was heavier, had lost some hair, and gained a few age marks. So what? Soon other old buddies showed up. They were still "Wild Man, Doc, Snake, Slick, Blaze," or whatever handle they were tagged with that fit at the time. Sometimes you didn't even know your buddies real name. Now, at the reunion you could finally find out. Together again.

To let you know (or remind you) of the sorts of our brothers who come to reunions, I'll talk about Vernon. Many of you knew him. Vernon was first sergeant for a tank company when we were operating along the Cambodian border. He was a big man, in more ways than just his size. Top was one of those firm but fair types that the troops respected, while doing whatever he ordered. I learned about him at the reunions. The troops knew from Vernon's firm leadership and his clear love for the men that he had saved a lot of lives. I got to know and love him later. After retirement he became a Methodist minister. When the call came to gather in Dallas for our first reunion, he and I met, formed a strong friendship, and were partner chaplains for our organization. Vernon died of an Agent Orange cancer several years ago. He and his troops are the sorts of brothers that come to reunions.

To show you in another way who comes to reunions, I point out that our organization was started by three enlisted troops. I think they were E-5s. One

still serves (Ollie), one died a few years ago (Big Jim), and one left for other things (Dave). Enlisted and officers of all ranks belong; many are regular and active. I was surprised one year when we invited a four star general to speak for the banquet. He was very well liked. I hadn't known him prior to his speaking. I was pleasantly enlightened when he told me that he'd been coming to reunions for about three years. I hadn't known it already because he came and sat with his troops, the men in his platoon when he was a lieutenant in Viet Nam. Our presidents have all been former enlisted, as you might expect. Except for Chuck. He retired as a full colonel. "Hey! (or Hay!)" you say? "So what's the big deal?" The big deal is that everyone is important. Everyone is equal. Everyone is respected. Everyone is wanted and appreciated. We live our motto of "Together Then -

Together Again."

It's important to recognize something else about reunions that make them so significant in our brothers lives: Our families are included fully in the organization. It's clear that the wives and kids of our fighting troops bore the brunt of everything that happened in the life of their soldier. So any and all are encouraged to bring their families along. Early on, many brought their wives and little kids. Now many are bringing their grandkids. It's plain and easy to see how healing and bonding this is in the life of families. I know several who brought their really young kids. The kids came and grew up together. They were buddies. They liked each other. I remember when April was a little kid. I also remember when she called years later. I was in California at the time. She was all excited. She said she was getting married

soon in Dallas and would I come and do the ceremony. So what do you think? Of course, I said yes. We had a great wedding. That was a few years ago. Now she and Chris have a family of their own.

Now I'm out of time so I'll sign off with a word about the Greatest Reunion that we all can look forward to if we sign on. From the Holy Bible: "Overwhelming victory is ours through Christ, who loved us. And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from his love. Death can't, and life can't. The angels can't, and the demons can't. Our fears for today, our worries about tomorrow and even the powers of hell can't keep God's love away.... Nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:37-39, NLT).
God bless you. God loves you. So do I.

This can't be anything except a tragic tale. Not the kind of story I like to write as it evokes more sorrow than joy. It is a bitter-sweet tale of the final days of the 2nd Squadron in Vietnam. From February through early March of 1972, the rush was on to send U.S. troops home. A lot of equipment was left behind, so were a lot of friends. Those friends included man's best friend, his dog. Some departures were difficult.

But I know leaving a dog behind was not the only cause of sorrow, all over Vietnam, relationship ceased when the Freedom Bird lifted off the runway. But nonetheless, leaving a dog was a hard thing to do.

This then is a story of a boy and his dog. Not a small boy and a Collie or Shepherd — no, this is the story of a battle-hardened lad and his mutt. Rusty the Trooper and Strawberry the faithful pup.

I don't know when or where Rusty found Strawberry, in fact I don't even know Rusty's first or surname, only the moniker that his fellow Blackhorse troopers pinned on him. I have a blurred picture of him when we made a trip to an orphanage which happened to coincide with one of his infrequent trips to the rear, but no picture of Strawberry. Rusty is playing paddle ball with the orphan kids in Goo Vap, and Strawberry was waiting patiently at the F Troop laager in Tay Ninh Province.

At least I think Rusty was from F Troop, I can't be sure. We had three Troops in the field and I visited each weekly for parts of two days. In my memory, they all blend together, but as I recall each Troop and each fire base had at least one dog. I believe that was the limit set by the CO.

Strawberry is the only dog I remember, and he was a memorable pup. All the guys in Rusty's platoon fussed over Strawberry, but it was clear he was Rusty's dog. I say "fussed" because I don't want to say "loved." I'm willing to bet they did, as anyone who has ever had a dog understands. Strawberry was a light brown mutt with a slightly pink tint to his color, and ... thus, the name Strawberry.

The pup followed Rusty everywhere and rode on top of his ACAV while we busted jungle and at night, he hunkered

down beside the track. He was awake and company for each one of the track members when they took their turn on top on those dark and foreboding nights. Strawberry was also, always there when we shared chow or lurps of C rations.

It was no exaggeration to say that Strawberry could be found lying in front of the ammo crates or beer cases that we piled up to make a make-shift altar for field Mass. And so it was each week. I too, found myself somewhat attached to that pup.

But then came the good news for Rusty, he was going home. The Blackhorse troops began leaving the field in late February to start the stand down and troopers were getting drops. One by one, E, F and G troop rolled into our newest and last fire base, Fiddlers Green. From there, after a shake down and spruce-up, it was a road march to Phu Loi. The Pentagon was anxious to get our kids home, and papers were processed for early drops as quickly as LT Kennedy could type.

The bad news: Strawberry was to stay behind. What was Rusty to do?

Well it is an old story. When there is a problem outside the chain of command, you go see the Chaplain. And Rusty did. He appeared at my door with Strawberry on a boot-stringed leash. He didn't have a lot of time, as he had to catch a ride to Long Binh to process out, and so with a lump in his throat, he said "Chaplain, take good care of Strawberry."

As Rusty turned and walked away, I couldn't see his eyes, but I know I would be crying if it was my dog. Lord knows, I cried buckets as I put mine to sleep. Strawberry whimpered and I had to hold the leash tight or he would have followed the truck all the way to Long Binh. In a few hours, Strawberry adopted a new buddy, and either stayed by my side or waited faithfully by the chapel door. He never seemed to wander far.

I still had made trips to the field, either to visit one of the others Troops that hadn't stood down as yet, or go down to Cu Chi and even back to Fiddlers Green. The first few times I left, Strawberry was there when I returned. Always with tail wagging and a paw raised. Then maybe on my last trip, I was gone for a few days and when I returned, no Strawberry.

I didn't have a Chaplain's Assistant; in fact I only had a Chaplain's assistant for my first week with the Regiment. No one to keep an eye on the dog. I had no idea where Strawberry was and as all the other hooches near the chapel were empty, not much luck asking around. That day, I even had to sign the chapel over to an ARVAN officer. It was getting lonely on Post. So many people were in-transition, that I had a hard time finding anyone who wasn't in a hurry to catch a ride out.

I did search the compound, even borrowed a jeep and roamed the vast base, which by that time was mostly empty or being dismantled. No Strawberry, in fact no dogs anywhere on the post at Phu Loi.

I haven't forgot Strawberry, my own golden retriever is much the same color and every time I play ball with her, I think of Strawberry and Rusty. Now, 42 years later, I finally have enough courage to tell Rusty, "I'm sorry Pal; I didn't do a good enough job watching over Strawberry." I too feel your loss.

And, as we all tell our children and grandchildren, "All dogs go to heaven".

Flag Ceremony

On October 29, 2014, a flag ceremony was conducted at Poor Richard's Café, Plano, Texas. The ceremony included presenting an 11th Armored Cavalry Association Flag for the veterans that served in Vietnam and Cambodia, 1966 to 1972. Approximately 50 participants attended including the Owner, Mr. Richard Butterly and General Manager, Mr. Jim Wells, of Poor Richard's Café. Other persons included, Jerry and Jan Beamon, Quartermaster, representing the national organization, Calvin Reese, Project Officer, and his son and grandson, Brad and Jacob. Jacob, age 5, led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance. Also, Colonel Lyle Metzler, Ret., Chaplain and member of the Texas State Guard, lead the group in prayer, first for those present and later a special prayer for those who made the ultimate sacrifice in all conflicts involving the US Military.

Also present was LTC Bernard Aikens, Ret., who is the Senior Instructor for the JROTC unit at Plano East High School. This school provided the Color Guard and Bugler for playing of TAPS. The highlight of the ceremony was when 11th Cavalry Trooper David Barnes, rode in on RC, his 23 year old thoroughbred Black Horse, to present the flag to Mr. Butterly. David was wearing his 1901 style Cavalry hat presented to him by Gen. Crow at the Houston Reunion years earlier where he and another trooper performed Color Guard duties.

This ceremony came about when two years earlier, Calvin and his wife, Sue, observed that the 11th Armored Cavalry flag was not among the Branch and Unit flags displayed at Poor Richard's during Memorial Day and Veterans' Day activities. Twenty-eight other Branch and Unit flags were on display honoring the veterans that served under them during times of conflict involving the US Military. After meeting with Mr. Butterly and Mr. Wells, they both agreed that the 11th Armored Cavalry flag should be represented with the group of flags being displayed. Calvin Reese, former HHT Commander, 3rd Squadron, 1966, requested that he be allowed to conduct a brief ceremony honoring members of the

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

• **Welcome to Vietnam.** In his welcoming remarks to the Blackhorse Regiment after landing at Vung Tau on 7 September 1966, Lieutenant General Jean Engler (Deputy Commanding General, US Army, Vietnam) said: "One of the most important missions in Vietnam is to take the roads away from the Vietcong and give them back to the people so that they may move freely. For this mission, by reason of firepower and mobility, your unit is eminently qualified."

• **Mines, mines, and more mines.** On 6 January 1967, Troopers from Alpha Troop uncovered a makeshift factory for making homemade anti-personnel and anti-tank mines about ten kilometers south of Blackhorse Base Camp. According to the Operations Summary (OPSUM) that was submitted, the factory contained "wooden boxes, CBU's [cluster bomb units] and [US] 105mm rds [rounds], rubber bands, and nails... explosives from the CBU's and 105mm rds were use[d] for the mine charges, the nails and rubber bands were used as detonators. All materials destroyed." The next day, just as the Troop was beginning its reconnaissance mission, an Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicle (ACAV) detonated a mine about 200 meters from the mine factory found the previous day. Again, according to the OPSUM, the blast resulted "in 8 track blocks, 2 road wheels, and all grease fittings being damaged. No casualties."

• **Gas bill.** During February, March, and April of 1968, Blackhorse helicopters flew 4,325 hours and consumed 198,870 gallons of fuel. Even at \$.23 a gallon (remember those prices?), that's an almost \$46,000 gas bill! Oh by the way, during the same period, they expended over one million rounds of 7.62 machine gun ammunition, over 4,000 rockets, and almost 7,600 40mm grenades.

• **Wiped out!** Throughout the Regiment's service in Vietnam, the enemy's propaganda machine routinely made exaggerated claims of having "wiped out" entire troops or even whole squadrons. On the 4th of March 1969, the Air Cavalry Troop's Aero Rifle Platoon, reinforced by aero scouts and gunships, as well as platoons from India Troop and Mike Company, came close to "wiping out" an entire company of the K33 Battalion, 96th Regiment, 69th (NVA) Artillery Command. Between the massive personnel losses suffered during the three phases of their offensive in 1968 (Tet of '68 in February, mini-Tet in May, and the final push in August), unrelenting pressure by US and Allied forces throughout 1968 and 1969, most NVA companies were averaging about 60 soldiers present for duty. Many VC local force units were down to less than 100 per battalion – a quarter of their normal strength. At mid-morning on March 4th while conducting a bomb damage assessment following a B-52 strike, aero scouts discovered an enemy force holed up in a bunker complex and the Aero Rifle Platoon was inserted, receiving small arms and RPG (rocket-propelled grenade) fire almost immediately. A platoon of infantry from Delta Company, 2nd Battalion, 28th Infantry (Big Red One) was the first to pile on, followed shortly thereafter by platoons from both India Troop and Mike Company. The firefight lasted throughout the afternoon, with the enemy finally breaking contact near dark. During the course of the contact,

seven US soldiers were wounded and required medevac, while three light observation helicopters (LOHs) were damaged. Enemy casualties were considerably higher – not only were 23 NVA soldiers killed during the engagement, but an additional dozen were captured. The prisoners reported that the C3 Company had a total of 48 men present for duty on the morning of 4 March. By that evening, 35 of the 48 were confirmed dead or captured – and, according to the regimental intelligence estimate, the "remaining 13 men were probably also killed when the tanks crushed the bunkers." The enemy prisoners included the company Executive Officer, an Assistant Squad Leader, another Sergeant, a medical Sergeant, four Corporals, and four Privates. The ARP Platoon Leader, First Lieutenant Thomas White (who went on to command the Regiment and become Secretary of the Army), and Specialist Five Armando Carillo, a platoon medic, were both awarded the Silver Star for their actions during this fight.

• **New Command Sergeant Major.** From the July 1970 edition of the Blackhorse Newspaper: "A twenty-year Army veteran, who was with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment when it came to Vietnam, is the new Regimental command sergeant major. Command Sergeant Major Hiram T. Harrison, a native of Killeen, Tex., succeeded Command Sergeant Major Donald E. Horn June 1 as the top enlisted man of the Blackhorse. Sgt. Maj. Harrison began his first tour in Vietnam in August 1966 when the 11th ACR deployed from Ft. Meade, Md. He was sergeant major of the 2nd Squadron until he completed his tour in July 1967. Returning in the middle of the Cambodian operation, Sgt. Maj. Harrison commented, 'They couldn't have selected a better unit than the 11th ACR for this type of mission. It's the best outfit in Vietnam.'"

• **Tanks up front.** From the July 1970 edition of the Blackhorse Newspaper: "'We're the Sunday punch,' says H Company First Sergeant Paul Curran. By 'we' he means the men and M48 medium tanks that make up a tank company. The punch (any day of the week) is delivered by a 90 millimeter main gun, a .50 caliber and an M60 machine gun. Each squadron in the field has a tank company which provides ready reaction support for the reconnaissance troops, escorts logistics convoys, and furnishes the bulk of fire power at the squadron night defensive positions. At 50 tons apiece, the tanks are the heavies of the Regiment – in more ways than one. 'When we go in, there's already a fight in progress,' says H Company commander Captain Harold Fuller. 'When the squadron moves, we're the lead element.' And with good reason, for up front the going is usually toughest. The big tanks can knock down jungle too thick for ACAVs [Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicles] and Sheridans. But ramming down trees eight inches in diameter creates special maintenance problems. That's where the M88 VTR [Vehicle Tracked Recovery] comes in. The M88 recovery vehicle is the workhorse of the tank company's maintenance team. Except for another M48, it's the only thing around big enough to drag out a downed tank. At the NDP [Night Defensive Position], a skilled crew can quickly put a disabled vehicle back into operation. All of which makes tank company almost self-sufficient. As Capt. Fuller says, 'With our own maintenance section, we're a complete unit.'"

• **Quan Loi remembered.** "Quan Loi comes as a shock when you step

off the plane. No comparison between it and Long Binh or Bien Hoa. Cut out of the rubber trees, the base camp looks like a splotch in the middle of 'no-man's land. Red dirt is embedded in everything. Well remembered about Quan Loi was the extreme abundance of red laterite clay DUST. Seems this stuff got into everything, our clothes, food, tents. I had red clay coming out of my pours for about 3 months after returning to the States. In the day time the VC were always trying to hit the ammo dump or the POL area, using the Quan Loi Tower as their aiming point. That was nerve racking... During the 'rainy' season, being able to set the clock by the 1600 hours rain fall starting... Quan Loi also got its 'SMALL' share of USO shows, and Red Cross Girls visiting. Remember the bands from the Philippines? Were they really as bad as I remember? How about a cool swim in the pool at the French Country Club on the Southwest side, after walking thru the perimeter wire to get there. Pretty weird seeing a 10 meter concrete diving platform in a war zone. Getting in and out of Quan Loi was simply a question of either getting a ride on a convoy up and down 'Thunder Road', which had to be swept for mines daily...or catching a ride on one of the flights coming to the airstrip. That choice was a real no brain'r..."

Troopers, families and friends, our 30th annual 11th ACVVC 2015 Reunion in Columbus, Georgia will be unique and more complicated than our previous reunions. This is because there is no single hotel in Columbus that can accommodate 1,200 - 1,400 people. We will be using the Columbus Convention & Trade Center for our reunion functions. Because we will be using four hotels it is imperative that all attendees familiarize themselves with the reunion schedule, transportation options and event venues. Complete information for the each of the hotels and convention center is listed in this issue.

For those attendees who do not have their own transportation free round-trip bus transportation will be available from each hotel to/from and the Columbus Convention & Trade Center and the National Infantry Museum (NIM) near the entrance to Fort Benning. We plan to have the bus shuttle Pick-Up (PU) and Drop-Off (DO) every thirty minutes. While the schedule has not been firmed up yet, we envision the last drop-off to be at 11:30 PM.

The reunion registration form includes a question box indicating your need for shuttle service. Please indicate on the reunion registration form if you will need bus transportation. We need to know this in order to contract for enough buses to move everyone comfortably from their hotel to the CCTC and Fort Benning. If you drive your own vehicle to the reunion we urge you to drive to the CCTC & the NIM. The 11th Cavalry Memorial Dedication on Thursday is just outside the entrance to Fort Benning. If you have a vehicle, we urge you to drive; there is ample parking at the NIM.

There are several optional events (at additional cost) for our attendees on Friday, August 21. The events at Fort Benning require the attendees to ride the bus. Security procedures on military bases were upgraded in January, 2015. Anyone over 16 years of age entering Fort Benning must have a valid photo ID. When you complete any of the optional tour registration forms it is imperative that you list the full name (first name, middle initial, last name) of all attendees. Security at Fort Benning requires this information and your photo ID to enter the post. (Details are listed in this issue)

1) Rangers in Action Demonstration. This tour is limited to the first 400 who register. Transportation furnished with pick-up at your hotel: Cost: \$20.00 per person.

2) Armor Restoration Facility at Sand Hill. This tour is limited to the first 400 who register and is not wheel-chair accessible. Transportation furnished with pick-up at your hotel: Cost: \$20.00 per person.

3) Women's Group Columbus tour. Please note that registration for this tour is limited to 100 ladies so please sign up as soon as possible. Transportation furnished with pick-up at your hotel. Cost: Lunch included at \$25.00 per person.

4) The 24th annual Marty Ognibene Golf Tournament will be held on Friday morning. Note this is a day later than in the past. Golf Director Joe Coopet will provide details at a later date in Thunder Run and on our website at: <http://www.11thcavnam.com/>.

There are several transportation options for those who fly to the reunion site. Columbus, Georgia, is served by Hartsfield International Airport in Atlanta, Georgia. The airport is approximately 110 miles from Columbus. Travel from the airport is via privately owned vehicle or shuttle service. Shuttle and Bus service is available from the airport to Columbus, GA for an additional cost. As an option, you may want to check flights into Columbus Airport

which is about 15 minutes from the four reunion hotels. Each of the hotels offer complimentary shuttle to and from the Columbus Airport. Flights are fewer and more costly when flying directly into Columbus.

Rental cars are available at Hartsfield. Shuttle service is also available 24 hours a day, seven days a week from Hartsfield to Columbus, GA for an additional cost.

Airport Shuttle Service provides shuttle service between Columbus and the Atlanta Airport 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Their fares are \$38 per person one way or \$71 round trip. Children 7 to 16 years of age ride for half the cost of the adult fare and children 6 and under ride free. All of their vans provide free Wi-Fi and soon all of their vans will feature family friendly videos. Groome Transportation provides shuttle service between Columbus and Atlanta Hartsfield International Airport seven days a week. Transportation from Fort Benning to Atlanta Airport is \$39 per person one way or \$72 roundtrip. This is a time when we honor the fallen comrades-in-arms who have served the 11th Cavalry in all campaigns throughout its history since 1901.



After the memorial dedication you can visit the World War II Company Street across the parade field. Although originally intended to be "temporary" in the 1940's many of these buildings were still in use in the 1960's and 1970's. This is a nostalgic look back at the "luxurious accommodations" in the barracks, mess hall, orderly room, supply room and chapel that many of you may have used during your service.



You will also have the opportunity to visit the National Infantry Museum for an on-your-own tour of this amazing state-of-the-art museum which traces the infantryman through the history of the United States. Be sure to visit the Armor Gallery on the lower level of the museum. The new gallery tells the Armor story through a mix of actual combat vehicles, uniforms, soldier equipment, wall displays, and dioramas that also showcase the Armor Museum collection.

2) Armor Restoration Facility at Sand Hill. This is where many of the armored vehicles are being restored for eventual display in the Armor and Cavalry Museum. Here you will see the world's largest collection of armored vehicles. Many U.S. as well as foreign armored vehicles are featured. The tour also includes a stop at the Armor School at Harmony Church for a static display of many of the vehicles and weapons used in today's Army. This tour is limited to the first 400 who register and is not wheel-chair accessible. Transportation will be furnished with pick-up at your hotel. Cost: \$20.00 per person.

3) Women's Group Columbus tour. First stop is the Columbus Museum for a guided tour of art and area history followed by a special ladies lunch at the historic Wynn House, which also includes a tour of the house. After lunch, re-board buses for a driving tour of the old city and along the river area and the port. This will include the 1800s churches followed by a stop at historic Linwood Cemetery. Please note that registration for this tour is limited to 100 ladies so please sign up as soon as possible. Transportation will be furnished with pick-up at your hotel. Cost: Lunch included at \$25.00 per person.

11th Cavalry Memorial Project

On Veterans Day, November 11, 2014, a groundbreaking ceremony for the new 11th Cavalry Memorial was held at the site of the future National Armor and Cavalry Museum in Columbus, Georgia.

Approximately 50 Blackhorse troopers, family and friends attended the groundbreaking of the new memorial. Construction for the memorial is scheduled to begin in March with an expected completion in May or June. The memorial will be re-dedicated during the 30th Annual Reunion on Thursday, August 20, 2015.

The ground breaking was held in conjunction with the official dedication of Patton's Park, the first phase in the overall development of the National Armor and Cavalry Museum. Several hundred attended the dedication where retired General William S. Wallace, 55th Colonel of 11th ACR (1992-1994) was the keynote speaker. The park is a 750 foot walking trail featuring nine combat vehicle displays tracing the develop-

ment of armor from WW II to the present and a parking area for 30 vehicles. It is located on Benning Boulevard just outside the gate at Fort Benning, GA and adjacent to the National Infantry Museum.

In July 2014, the 11th Cavalry Memorial was carefully packed up and moved from Fort Knox to Columbus, GA. The monument is the first to be located on the site of the future National Armor and Cavalry Museum. The new memorial will feature all the components of the original memorial including the Vietnam Memorial, the three memorials which are dedicated to the Philippine, World War II and Iraqi Freedom campaigns, plus all the granite bricks which surround the memorial.

The move also provided an opportunity to add several new features. These new additions include a bronze plaque placed in front of the Vietnam monument with a narrative of the history and special significance of this particular monument. Two additional, free-standing granite stones will be added to the

memorial site. One stone will contain a brief history of the 11th Cavalry since 1901 and will feature a large Blackhorse insignia. The second granite stone will list the 24 campaigns credits of the 11th Cavalry since 1901 along with the regimental crest.

The cost of the move is being shared between the 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia and the Blackhorse Association. Both organizations offered granite bricks to help offset the cost of this project. Many veterans as well as family members purchased bricks to honor their service to our regiment. A combined total of 550 new brick orders were received. This brings the total to approximately 1,450 bricks when the monument is complete. This is a true sign of support from Blackhorse veterans as they honor their service with the 11th Cavalry and to the fellow Blackhorse troopers whose names are listed on the memorials.

We hope you will join us for our reunion in August and the memorial dedication.
