Admission Will Be Free, Experience 'Priceless'

ext year, as the Army celebrates its 245th birthday, the National Museum of the United States Army will open its doors, marking the first time the contributions of soldiers in shaping the nation are shared, honored and remembered in a common space.

Located on 84 acres about 15 miles south of Washington, D.C., the museum is at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, on publicly accessible land with a dedicated entrance. Some 700,000 visitors are expected each year, and admission will be free.

The museum's glass and steel facade stands in contrast to its wooded surroundings. It will soon offer an enduring home for soldiers past, present and future to gather, share their history, read their stories and honor their fallen.

Construction began in March 2017, and progress has been made possible chiefly through \$42.5 million in financial contributions from the Association of the U.S. Army. The educational nonprofit's contribution exceeds the combined contributions of the next 20 donors, making it the single-largest museum donor. One-third of AUSA's chapters have also donated money.

AUSA's support is in line with its core missions of supporting the U.S. Army, informing the public about the vital role the Army has played in American history, and promoting and perpetuating Army values and traditions.

"Without our association, the National Museum of the United States Army would still be an unfulfilled idea," said retired Gen.

Under the direction and stewardship of the Army Historical Foundation, the idea for the museum became reality, and the project has taken shape since ground was broken in September 2016. The 185,000-square-foot facility will eventually be transferred to the Army to maintain and manage. The Army Historical Foundation will remain responsible for generating revenue over the life span of the museum.

Packing a Lot of History

Designed by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, the six-story museum building and sprawling grounds comprise a multidisciplinary complex that will invite visitors to explore and linger through displays, gardens, trails and interactive educational experiences.

Entering the expansive lobby pavilion, visitors will step onto a cool white terrazzo floor emblazoned with the Army seal. Straight ahead, they will see an imposing 21-foot-high Honor Wall etched with the names of each of the Army's battles. Overhead, illuminated glass campaign streamers will line the beamed ceiling.

The educational experience will begin with a series of chronological and thematic galleries on the ground floor that include elaborate exhibits with artifacts, documents, images, life-size plaster-cast figures of soldiers through history, and artwork that tells the Army's story since it was founded in 1775.

Chief among the galleries and installations will be three main attractions, starting with the Soldiers' Stories Gallery, a column of interactive pylons beginning on the walkway approaching the museum's entrance and continuing inside, leading visitors into the main display area. Each pylon will contain personal stories told by generations of soldiers. Within the main exhibit wing will be an area dedicated to the Army and Society Gallery, highlighting the Army's long-standing mutual relationship with civilians, and the Fighting for the Nation Galleries, a series of six smaller galleries that cover different periods in the Army's history from the Revolutionary War to the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

On the museum's second floor, a Special Exhibits Gallery for temporary installations will highlight U.S. Army art on a rotational schedule.

Something for Everyone

An attraction that promises to become popular with visitors is an immersive sensory theater that will show Of Noble Deeds, a film about the Army's history told through the Army Values. The film will be shown several times each hour.

The theater's 300-degree, 4D video screen surrounds a seating area with swiveling chairs, flashing strobes and a vibrating floor. The experience will re- create the sound of a helicopter and the feel of the rotors' wind, the rumble of a passing Humvee and the clacking rifles of the U.S. Army Drill Team.

On the opposite side of the lobby, through a set of glass doors, a dedicated, highly interactive educational space will be geared toward younger visitors, including small children.

The inviting Experiential Learning Center is close to being complete. It is illuminated by the glow of oversized interactive screens in five stations that focus on kids working in teams to carry out Army missions. The learning space and mission modules provide the opportunity to test and develop skills in geography, science, technology, engineering and math.

Within the space is a smaller enclosed area with a carpet-and-rubber floor called



Fort Discover, where kids can climb on a two-story mock Army fort, play educational video games or see themselves in different Army uniforms through Camo Camera, an interactive photo booth.

Another feature of the learning center is an interactive wall installation called Growing Up Army, which allows visitors to touch different images on a screen to see firsthand accounts from Army families around the world.

Museum Director Tammy Call explained that, while generations of soldiers and their families are expected to visit, the museum is designed for the public, including visitors who may be learning about the Army for the first time.

"It's a public-facing museum, and while we tell the history of the Army through the eyes and voices of the soldier, we're also aware that many people are not necessarily familiar with the Army's history," Call said. "The goal is for the visitor to see a reflection of themselves, that soldiers are their neighbors."

Among the many ways visitors will learn more about the experiences of soldiers, veterans, Army civilians, the supporting community and the animals that worked with the Army will be three digital registry kiosks.

Group Settings

The museum's interior also has areas for gatherings and is complemented by exterior gardens and surrounding grounds, where visitors can relax in one of many landscaped park and seating areas, attend events or explore additional interactive activities.

One of the most anticipated areas is the Medal of Honor Garden, a contemplative space nestled into a rooftop terrace garden that highlights the Army's recipients of the highest award for valor on the battlefield.

An interactive Army Trail through a wooded area will have a series of stations where participants can learn lessons about Army survival tactics. An amphitheater will be a place for ceremonies and events, while a grandstand with a parade ground will be used for demonstrations and reenactments.

Back inside, flooded in natural light on the museum's second floor, the multipurpose, patriotic-themed Veterans' Hall is a space ideal for meetings, reunions, dinners and banquets. Larger events may take place in the lobby, which can accommodate private events for up to 460 people.

Visitors can get a bite to eat at the cafe, which includes an outdoor patio, and remember their visit with a purchase at the museum store.

Continued Funding

Army supporters and museum visitors can help with the continuing need to fund the museum or honor their soldier's legacy in several ways.

The Army Historical Foundation's Commemorative Brick Program is a fundraising mechanism, but it also serves as an enduring tribute to soldiers, units, families and supporters. Each personalized brick will line the Path of Remembrance, the brick walkway that will lead visitors to the museum's main entrance.



There are outdoor spaces dedicated to commemorating Army units, and seats in the theater and benches in the museum's gardens can accommodate a dedication. The alcoves in the museum's Veterans' Hall can be dedicated.

Corporate programs and tribute gifts are available, and opportunities for individuals or organizations are set up to help with fundraising.

But none of these options is required for a great visit to the museum, because admission will be free and "the experience will be priceless," said retired Lt.

Gen. Roger Schultz, president of the Army Historical Foundation. "After a visit to the museum, you'll have an appreciation for soldiers' selfless service to our nation."

Funding for the museum has come from some 178,000 founding sponsors, Schultz said.

"Every donation counts," he said. "It's the collection of donations at all levels that make this project what it is. Without that, we couldn't get it done."

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not miss" sights are the Medal of Honor Memorial, the World War memorial, the Vietnam Memorial, the USS Indianapolis Memorial (it has a very interesting history in WW II) and the Soldiers and Sailors Monument in Monument Circle. A nightly light show has just been added using state of the art light and sound for a patriotic salute. You can even take a horse carriage ride there if you like. There are two museums across the street from the hotel that are very interesting, the Eiteljorg Museum and the Indiana State Museum; the Eiteljorg also has a small café.

There will be a scooter rental program in place again but the hotel is not involved this year. I am working on a discounted rate from them, more to come in the next issue of the TR. There will also be a trolley service to the downtown area's restaurants, shops, breweries, monuments and memorials. Please take advantage of the transportation away from the hotel. It is there to provide some relief from the hotel food and beverage costs.

The trolley service is of no cost to the membership and gratuities are included, and are quite generous. So, unless you just have a desire to tip it is not required. However, gratuities are expected at the hotel to basically anyone that touches your luggage or parks your car if valet services are used. So be mindful of the proper etiquette. The amount is up to you. The trolley will run from 8 AM - 8PM Wed. the 26th to Fri. the 28th. The schedule and stops will be available when you pick up your name tags at the registration booth. The trolley does not go to the airport.

There is shuttle service from the airport to the hotel priced at \$12 each way. Taxi service is \$25-\$30 each way, and there is always Uber or Lyft if you are into that type of transportation.

I must remind everyone again to make your reservations before the cut off dates, and the earlier the better, those dates again are August 3, 2020 for the hotel and August 5, 2020 for the reunion. Reservations for either will not be accepted after these dates. You can cancel reunion reservations up to August 15th and receive a refund.

The 11th ACVVC Officers/Board of Directors put a lot of work into making this reunion as affordable as possible; the first being the \$80 registration fee. Please take advantage of the 15% discounts at the previously mentioned hotel restaurants and the downtown trolley, scooter rentals and discounted parking.

There will be more updates as the year progresses. I am looking forward to seeing each of you in August and having another great reunion.

Part II The Real Rambo

"In regards to serving his country he felt "It was the price you pay for living here" Helen Ryan Rambo Christensen

rthur John Rambo graduated first in his class from Field Artillery NCO School (aka, "Advanced Combat Leadership" or in a derogatory fashion as "Shake-N-Bake" or "Instant NCO") at Fort Sill, Oklahoma and was promoted to Staff Sergeant,

E-6. Shortly thereafter he shipped out to Vietnam, arriving in country on Aug 19, 1969. He was assigned to the Howitzer Battery, 3rd Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. The 11th ACR was a unique unit in that it had M-109, 155mm Self Propelled Howitzer batteries (one in each squadron) integrated into the TOE. Each battery traveled with the "line" troops and tank companies and occupied fire bases with these units.

The character displayed by SSGT Rambo in Vietnam was formed early in his life in farmlands near Libby, Montana. His "kid" sister Patty remembers her big brother as "... *my sense of strength and solid ground.*"

"I do remember one incident that speaks of Artie's character. One New Year's Eve (1961, 62, 63ish?!) when he was still in high school, he came home late but before my parents. He had me clean some blood off him before they saw him. He had been to the hospital and had a butterfly bandage on his evebrow over his left eve but they hadn't cleaned him up very well and he wanted me to help. Well, I was a little shocked cause I never knew Artie to GET into a fight before, at least not to this extent. He finally told me what happened in his modest downplayed version. He and some of his friends had been "out" (kids didn't get in trouble in Libby in those days - they would just "pal around") and someone had been harassing an Indian kid who was a few years younger than Artie but his family was friends of our family. Adrian's mom had babysat for me and Dan over the years. So Artie stepped in to stop the situation and apparently took the brunt of the bully's action. As Artie would say: "'t's the price you pay'...for doing the right thing."

On November 25, as part of Operation Texas Traveler, elements of 3rd Squadron, including L Troop, Headquarters Troop, 919th Engineer Company and Howitzer Battery set up a Night Defensive Position (NDP) between An Loc and the Cambodian border. At 0400 hrs on 26 NOV 69 the NDP came under attack from Rocket Propelled Grenade (RPG) fire.

SGT John Walters (Charles Town, West Virginia) remembers, "I was awoken by explosions, fire and screaming. We were being overrun by two companies of NVA. Sp4 Shockley got in our gun (M-109) to drive and I led him and our crew out of the area. SSGT Beavers and the Lieutenant and our crew hid in the jungle until daylight. I remember the Cobra's mini-guns shell casings falling on us. Sam King was directing the Dust-off helicopters with a flashlight to get the wounded out. Guns #1 and #6 were blown up that night. Even after fifty years I relive that night at least twice a week. I received the Bronze Star and Purple Heart that night but I would gladly trade them for the life of Art Rambo, a true friend and a real hero in my book. Every time Sylvester Stallone has a movie it brings back bad memories. Thanksgiving is my worst holiday but I am thankful I am still alive. SSGT Rambo will always be remembered as long as I am alive."

Sam King (Sherwood, Arkansas) describes the events of Nov 26, "I was on the #5 gun and didn't know Art that well. Farmer (Johnnie Reynolds, Bloomfield, Nebraska) and I were sleeping besides our M-548 (tracked cargo/ammo carrier) when everything blew up. The first vehicle hit was an ACAV (Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicle) from Headquarters, Headquarters Troop, 3/11. There was a Captain from HHT who lost his leg that night. I helped dust-off the wounded and when the wounded were evacuated we discovered SSGT Rambo's body."

1LT Rod Chisholm (San Antonio, Texas) recalls of SSGT Rambo, "Many times after the conclusion of a fire mission, Art would drop by the TOC (Tactical Operations Center) to ascertain how effective we were in achieving our assigned goal. Art was unique in this regard and I enjoyed our conversations.

I recall one specific fire mission that

required all the care and experience to be put to work. There was a frantic call from a squad that was operating in our AO (Are of Operations). 'Infantry...ambushed...leadership out of commission.' The squad was in a ditch on one side of a dirt road, while the enemy was on the other side. Our mission was to provide fire on their (enemy) side of the road and not on ours...a tall order.

I got Art on the land-line and told him this specific fire mission was to be using only his gun. To allay the risk, I calculated that we would aim the round to land 100 meters behind the enemy, so that a gust of wind wouldn't have an adverse effect. Art fired, the single round was a direct hit on the enemy! This changed the entire battle in our favor.

Art reloaded, we made a slight adjustment, moved the impact 50 yards and fired again. Home run!

The next morning we met the infantry squad. They came by to express their thanks for saving their lives.

All in a day's work!

Much has been reported on the Thanksgiving Eve battle whereby we lost Art. The singular item that I will always remember is the act of heroism that was provided by Art Rambo."

(Editor's note: At the 1997 reunion in Las Vegas a number of 3rd How Bat Troopers got together and reminisced late into the night. I remember Rod talking about the days of Nov 25-26, 1969. In the afternoon of 25 Nov he had been given a teletype in an envelope which he stuck in his pocket. Following the Nov 25 ambush and the chaos of the early morning of Nov 26, he had endured a very busy day. Sometime later, when all the casualties had been medevaced out, ammo resupplied and a perimeter secured, he finally had a chance to sit down and take a breather. He remembered the teletype letter and opened it to read the news that his wife had just given birth.)

Patrick Garmon (Columbia, Tennessee, deceased Sep 22, 2016) was a Captain and the 3rd Squadron Howitzer Battery Commander. In an interview with West 57th Street (televised ~1985) he recalls writing the letter to Art's parents: "It was the hardest thing I ever did. He was a good soldier and

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As I crouched down and looked around, pure, absolute, soul-sucking hell was no comparison to what I saw. Vehicles everywhere were on fire, demolished, or simply not there anymore.

a good human being. He was the only soldier killed under my command. It was hard to accept and I never really forgot. (Regarding the Rambo movies) Any person that lets their children see something like that and doesn't remind them that it's entertainment, he ain't never been there and he'll never understand what it's really like. The guy in the Rambo movie...if he behaved like that in my unit he would've lasted ten minutes. There's something wrong with our society if they want to glorify that type of action. There's absolutely nothing glamorous about war. It's very hard, it's hard on individuals...it's even harder on their families."

Dennis Ashby (Effingham, South Carolina) writes: "I knew him and then he was gone. I was young at the time Art was killed but I remember well the early morning when it happened. When daylight came, I then knew I was in a war that would change my life forever. I was only 18 and saw death and destruction all around me. I was scared and angry at the same time. Scared that I would be next, and angry that the NVA took your life. Art was a hero to me.

Jim "Doc" Moses (San Jose, California) was a Combat Medic assigned to the 3rd Squadron Howitzer Battery. Jim provided a ten-page narrative of the action and of his impression of Art Rambo, the man. "It's been almost fifty years, but I remember some of those times as if they happened yesterday. (Late afternoon, Nov 25, moving through the jungle) The sounds of M-60s and .50 cals firing and the distinctive sounds of RPGs became every Troopers reality.

The column stopped. The leading elements had entered the area we were to set up in, encountered enemy troops who initiated an ambush. An ambush they had all day to plan...

Because of the density of the jungle and the undulations in the terrain I was unable to see where this was happening. Still, there was no doubt that what was happening was "right there". (The ambush was repulsed, the wounded evacuated and Jim continues.) "We did eventually move into our nightdefensive-position where everyone immediately began preparation for an attack that was sure to come. (Gun chiefs and section chiefs were called to a briefing and told to expect to "get hit". Jim continues.) "Walking back with Gary Ogles and Art Rambo, whose gun was set up to the right of Gary's by about thirty yards, Art and I parted with words of caution and encouragement. Probably something along the lines of, 'be careful, man' and 'watch out for yourself'. These were ordinary words; nothing particularly articulate or prophetic about them. But whatever the words, they were the last words I would exchange with Art, at least while he was alive. (The Troopers would settle in for the night...Jim continues.) I had a mental picture of the position and location of the vehicles and 'my guys'.

I don't know what time it was but I turned to my buddy and whispered 'I can smell them cooking'. And it was true; there were definitely cooking smells coming from somewhere close by. Ordinarily the NVA/VC would direct the vents of kitchens and common areas away from their origins. In this case the smells were so strong it seemed as if they didn't care if we knew they were there or not.

Around 0400 a whooshing sound passed over our heads. And something exploded behind us as we dove into the depression in front of us. I immediately realized we were between the origin of the attack and our vehicle. I remember thinking, this was not a good place to be and as we started up the incline a second RPG went over our heads and hit the ground. (Jim and his buddy seek cover inside SSGT Ogles Howitzer just as an RPG hits the 548 behind them.) Howitzer rounds and powder exploded, spraving shrapnel all over the back of the gun. I knew I had work to do and I told SSGT Ogles I had to get out there. The rear hatch was unusable, but he told me we could drop down through the trap door, which we did.

As we lay there under the gun I saw an entire turret, with gun tube included, flying through the air trailing flames, smoke and debris as another gun exploded.

Upon hearing the call of 'Medic' I responded and found a Trooper on the ground holding his leg. To get some cover I carried him to the closest vehicle, an M-88, and slid him in. I used the red interior lights to look at his foot after I cut his boot off. I dressed his foot, exited the vehicle and slid the Trooper back onto my shoulder.

As I crouched down and looked around, pure, absolute, soul-sucking hell was no comparison to what I saw. Vehicles everywhere were on fire, demolished, or simply not there anymore.

I spotted a silhouette kneeling down with a radio handset to his ear, so I ran to him and set my casualty down. I didn't know who he was but he appeared and acted like he had a plan, not to mention the radio. (Jim thinks the 'kneeling figure' was LtCol David Doyle, 3rd Sqd Cmdr.) I identified myself as the How Battery Medic, and he said we would set up a rallying point right there, and treat who we could with what we had then wait for the Medevacs to come in. Training, and adrenalin, having already kicked in, I went back out to pick up more wounded, wherever they were.

After bandaging one, then two, then more coming in I heard 'Check him out' as a couple of Troopers brought in another litter with another casualty. I found no head wounds or any obvious bleeding, but he was clearly going into shock. I heard later that he had been hit full frontally by a huge piece of metal from one of the M-109s, a spade used to stabilize the gun when firing. I tried to load him on one of the first medivacs but was told 'the dead and dving go last'. This was a harsh lesson but the reality of military triage meant he had to wait. I stayed with him as much as I could under the circumstances, until after dawn when he was flown out. (Jim learned the Trooper died of his wounds the next day,)

The attack was repelled with the aid of the line troops, helicopter gunships and a visit from "Spooky"; all very much appreciated and for which I am grateful to this day, but serious damage had been done.

After I checked back in with How Battery, I learned Art Rambo had been killed, and the world dropped out from beneath me. I had admired Art from the time I had met him sev-

Meet the Officers of the 11th ACVVC

Ollie Pickral, then and now.



Ollie W. Pickral, 11th ACVVC Treasurer

O llie Pickral was born in 1947 in Newport News, Virginia, under extreme poverty. Orphaned In 1951, Ollie was sent to the Baptist Orphanage of Virginia, situated in the Blue Ridge mountains near Roanoke, VA. Times were hard there as well. With as many as 200 children, they milked cows, raised chickens, hogs and beef cattle and they raised their own vegetables. Ollie stayed there until graduating from high school and entering college at local, Virginia Western.

After one year of college, Ollie failed to return to school and Uncle Sam was quick to draft him in the Army. On May 13. 1968, he was sent to basic training at Fort Benning, GA where it was sandy, hot and muggy. With the completion of basic, no leave was granted and he was bused to Fort Knox for armor training. After 8 weeks training there, he was granted 13 days leave then sent to Vietnam in late September of 1968. At the 90th Replacement Center, he was assigned to the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. He recalls the hum of comments made as soldiers were assigned to the Blackhorse as if they were going into a hellish inferno. Once at Blackhorse basecamp near Xuan Loc. he was assigned to K Troop. 3rd Sadn.

K Troop had just replenished its troopers after firefights and Deros out so the CO sent him to the K Troop mortar section of 3 ACAVs with 4.2 inch mortars (M106) and one ACAV (M113) for the Forward Observer. Having had no experience or training with artillery, he learned quickly to be one of those "mortar guys".

On May 13, 1969, K Troop was ambushed and Ollie received shrapnel from an RPG round, was "dusted off" but was back in the bush in just a couple of days. Six months after joining the mortars, he was assigned to be Track Commander for the F.O. track and remained there until leaving Vietnam in late September, 1969. After returning back to "the world", Ollie was assigned to the 82nd Airborne Div. at Fort Bragg for the remaining 8 months of his two year obligation.

Ollie was hired by the Immigration and Naturalization Service as a Contracts Specialist in Richmond, VA in 1972. They later moved their office to Dallas, TX and Ollie moved there, working for the INS for 15 years. He was later hired and promoted to Contracting Officer, Dept. of Defense (DoD) and he retired from Federal Service after 30 years of serving our country.

In 1984, Ollie attended the ceremony of the Three Fighting Soldiers dedication in Washington DC. There he met many Blackhorse Vietnam troopers and contacted them via letter to have a reunion of Blackhorse war veterans in the Dallas area. In late 1985, Ollie founded the 11 ACVVC and pursued organization requirements with the State of Texas and the Internal Revenue Service to promote membership and start having reunions. Ollie was the first President of 11 ACVVC and went on to be President again for a total of 12 years. During his presidency, he also handled the funds of 11 ACVVC and has been the Treasurer for over 30 years.

After retirement from the Defense Dept., Ollie moved back to his home state, residing in the coastal town of Kilmarnock, VA, noted for its crab and oysters and small town atmosphere.

Ollie has one daughter, April "Punkie" who grew up in the 11th ACVVC, son-inlaw Chris and his granddaughter Haley who reside in Plano, Texas.

With two years of service in the Army, Ollie's awards include the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Combat Infantryman's Badge, National Service ribbon, Vietnam Service ribbon, Vietnam Campaign medal, Meritorious Unit award and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry. Since Vietnam, he was selected as the 11 ACVVC Trooper of the Year in 2010, selected to be in the Honor Rolls of the Blackhorse Regiment and also selected for the 11th Cavalry's Order of the Spur.

He is a member of the VFW and served as Post Commander in Texas. He is a member of the Military Order of the Purple Heart and was Southwest Regional Treasurer for Vietnam Veterans of America.

Ollie spends his retirement being the Treasurer of this organization, working out at the YMCA, travelling to Texas and spoiling his granddaughter as much as he can.

How important is your DD 214? Happy New Year Blackhorse!

As I work for a State Department of Veterans Affairs, I and other VSOs receive requests from veterans for a copy - or copies - of their DD 214. Most of the time, we do have a vet's document, provided they have given us one previously. Occasionally, we do not. When this occurs, we will assist a vet, or family member, submit a request to the National Personnel Records Center. This process though is rather slow. And of course, the need for a DD 214 is often urgent.

I share this with readers as a point of advice- keep <u>plenty copies of your DD</u> <u>214 available</u> and inform your family of where those copies are! I cannot emphasize this enough! Hey- in the advent of your demise, your family will be burdened enough with other matters without the turmoil and anxiety of locating your DD 214. That one-page piece of government paper is required for all last honors to which you and all veterans are entitled to. Here's why-

For every portion of military honorsthe Flag, headstone, burial expense reimbursement, burial in a VA cemetery and related items, a copy of your DD 214 must be included with every form. Granted- most funeral homes are very adept and professional assisting families during the process- yet having plenty of DD 214's makes the process easier. Further, make the process smoother still.

The following forms are the most frequently used. Each is available to download at va.gov, forms. Complete each form as much as possible then set aside and inform your family where to locate same (do not keep these is bank safety box!)

Troopers who need them. We'll need your Name, Mailing address, Rank, Unit and years you served. An example would be:

SGT John A. Doe B TRP 2/11 68-69 123 Main St Arlington, VA 12345

The request to have the Regimental Unit Insignia amended is still slowly moving along and we should know soon if it will be approved or not. It has successfully cleared every obstacle thus far and is now in the Pentagon for final determination. Once we find something out, you will be the first to know.

This Regiment is so proud of all of you. The support you give to the Regiment and to each other after all these years is impressive. If any of you are near our Nation's capital on the Regimental Birthday -02 February – we will be there to place our BLACKHORSE wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. Please join us if you can.

20/20 Hindsight

In January of 1972, the last Blackhorse Firebase in Vietnam was under construction. By the end of January, the 2nd Squadron's security responsibility included the area bordering on the Song Be River to its north and east and the Dong Nai River to the south. Firebase Fiddler's Green was being constructed, but not without interruption.

Halfway down the road to hell, in a shady meadow green Are the souls of all dead troopers camped, Near a good old-time canteen. And this eternal resting place, Is known as Fiddler's Green.

While the engineers worked to turn the "shady meadow green" into a dusty and arid plain, E, F and G troops swept the surrounding area with mounted and dismounted patrols. The engagements with the enemy were frequent, tediously dangerous and yet effectively successful. But nonetheless, we lost five courageous troopers and suffered numerous casualties both at Fiddler's Green, in the Aero Rifle Platoon, and on the dismounts of E, F and G Troops.

But in 1972, we were also pulling out. Not retreating. We engaged every day with fewer and fewer troops and yet it was the enemy who pulled away. Possibly biding its time until the Blackhorse went away; or, and in fact, because they couldn't take the heat generated by the diesel giants nor the aggressiveness of the men who rode them. [Looking forward to the 11th ACVVC Historian, Don Snedeker's soon to be published book: Blackhorse in Vietnam.]

The so called "down-sizing" was in effect. Not instituted by the military gurus on the ground, but by the diplomats in Paris and Washington. The last Blackhorse Squadron (the 2nd) was to go home. Not in the proud and traditional sense that they would march out with banners flying in perfect formation and before a cheering crowd. No, instead the Colors were to go to Saigon with a small contingent of officers to be "cased" and flown to Fort Lewis, in Washington state. There they were to be retired, until the Pentagon found another use, another theatre for an Armored Cavalry Regiment. Though at the time, we were disheartened to hear that our proud record of six years was to be buried in a closet, no one was surprised how quickly the Regiment was brought back to the forefront and shipped off to Germany to plug a gap. Before 1973, I doubt that any of us had heard of Fulda Gap.

But back in Vietnam, in February and March, the Blackhorse troops who had completed a hundred and eighty-one days in country, were going back to the states: individually. No fanfare, no parade, no salute for a job well done. They left the field, in ones and twos, packed their gear one day and jumped on a truck or Huey the next. Those who hadn't reached that magic number remained behind and by the end of March were reassigned in-country.

48 years later, we can look back and shake our heads. We told them so, they didn't listen and our understanding didn't come from 20/20 hindsight. But that's all behind us now. Now we only recall the routine life in the field, the rush to clear and pack our gear, a Our reunions have been successful, but still not inclusive enough. quick good bye to buddies we only knew by nicknames, and then standing in line to complete the paper work and to catch that "Freedom Bird."

Some of us watched flights take off from Bien Hoa, where we stood in our stained and torn khakis with another outfit. But as Blackhorse veterans we still stood out. Our olive-drab greens were really "olive-drab" next to freshly starched uniforms of our new units. Though we spruced up as best we could, still our drab and worn garb became a symbol of pride; a pride that was not a sin, a pride that was well earned – proud that we had served with the Legendary Blackhorse Regiment.

2020 may be this year's number, but it invokes laughter for me. 2020 reminds me of my own father; his fellow steelworkers of Pittsburgh called him "Dutch." He was a joyful guy who as I recall, everyone liked. He died 30 years ago, but is still well remembered. When the old and mostly widowed aunts and cousins of our Slovak ethnic family greeted him with: "Dutchie, you look good." He would answer with a Santa Claus twinkle: "that's because you still have 20/20 vision." Some didn't get it right away, but sooner or later everyone smiled.

Of course, my prayers and good wishes are that you have a joyfilled year in 2020. That this year, you look back at your life and smile and then look forward with hope and smile all the more. For some of us there may be tragedy, but we will still be able to smile at our memories, at our accomplishments, at the good times we had, and those we can still look forward to.

My prayer is that the 11th ACVVC cadre, all of you – with your family and friends will continue on, still gathering in places that bring us together ... to smile. By the time you get this newsletter, some will have already celebrated the 119th birthday of the 11th Cavalry Regiment by placing a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery. A few hearty souls from the DC Area, as well as troopers from the active duty regiment at Fort Irwin, gather in the early morning cold on February 2nd to stand in awe, to salute our fallen veterans and all American veterans in silence and reverence. They brave the cold, which is uncomfortable to say the least, and then they see those Tomb Guards who march precisely and with sincere 'gravitas' no matter what the weather conditions and feel ashamed that we might dare complain about cold feet.

Other troopers will gather in Wisconsin, Texas, California, Colorado and other places around the nation to greet their brothers.

We go back to Washington each year on Memorial Day and Veterans Day to honor our fallen and those who wore the uniform. This summer we gather in central Indiana for our 35th Reunion, and a special moment there will be a Memorial Service to salute "the souls of all dead troopers camped near a good old-time canteen."

Our reunions have been successful, but still not inclusive enough. We get large crowds compared to other veteran organizations: we are at the top of the heap. But far less than 10% of our enrolled members make it to the reunions. For those who do come, they know the trip was worth it. The chance to share our pride with our battlefield brothers is nothing short of a joyful jolt; a physical and mental high.

Sure, we will probably know very few, and hardly anyone from our unit and time, but we will meet other Blackhorse Troopers who wore the same uniform, the same shoulder patch and rode on the same kind of tracked vehicles. And together we will laugh and play, frolic and pray, and share a hearty back slap or a fraternal "manly hug." Maybe only for a few moments, a few days, but we go home refreshed and with new memories, new appreciation, a new understanding of those brave men and women who showed-up, served their country and put their lives on the line for each other, for the regiment, and for God and Country. Allons!

eral months before.

He embodied all the virtues I thought were valuable, as well as being an outstanding Trooper and a natural leader. I had talked with him many times and understood the love he had for his family, and the good care he took of those under him. He was in Vietnam for the same reason I was, which was to fulfill his obligation to his country. I admired him to the extent that his loss was devastating to me for many years. I thought about him every day and tried unsuccessfully to make sense out of what happened.

Life did finally carry on when I realized that I had to be a better person; a person with the very virtues and values I had so much admired in Art. I carry his memories close to my heart and it has worked out very well for me.

I have been very happily married for forty-six years, and retired from a successful career in the medical field. There have been challenges, but life always has them and it's up to us to deal with them. Thanks to Art Rambo I've become a better person; hopefully a fitting tribute to the man I had looked up to so long ago"

Billy Mitchell (Nevada City, California) was the Gunner on Art's M-109. "We were good friends. Art talked about Helen and Kerry all the time. He was very excited when Amy was born -I wish I had a cigar to give him. About 3:30 in the afternoon, we came upon them...we could see the dinks in the woods setting up. It was our first firefight (both survived). At 0400 I was laying on my cot, Art was getting up off his cot. When we got hit – it was so quick – whether it was our track or the one next to us, that got hit first, they were both gone. It was a wall of jagged flame an inch above your nose. Art didn't suffer." (Billy was severely wounded but survived and was medevaced out the next day.)

Back in Libby, Montana, the Rambo family was preparing for Thanksgiving. Art's "kid sister" Patty recalls:

"Artie was reported "missing" on Thanksgiving Day. I was with my boyfriend's family in Kalispell when our family got the word. His death was not official until later. I was back at school in Spokane when I was told to get on the plane and fly to Missoula, MT where my folks and Dan were for Dan's high school basketball game. My best friend from Libby and past roommate from Helena met me at the airport and took me to the family home of some of Artie and Helen's friends from college (who had lost their only son [2LT David P. Sullivan] in Viet Nam semirecently as well). The Sullivan family, in spite of their grief, took our family under their wing and "protected" us in our numbing shock and grief stricken state (we ALL knew Artie was computing!!!?) Dan's coach told Dan he could sit out the game but Dan played... he was the high point scorer and he led in rebounds that night. That's how he dealt with his sense of loss.

I have never enjoyed the holidays since... any of them. I am grateful that there is now recognition not just for the Gold Star Mothers but for the Gold Star Families as well.

Daddy playing his guitar and Artie playing his ukulele. There had always been a lot of music in our house with Mom playing the piano, Daddy on the guitar.... Artie performed in groups and solo so he was always practicing his music. (I knew all his music because, when no one was around, I'd plunk out the songs on the piano - my hero worshipping again).

After Artie was killed, my Dad never sang nor played the guitar again as far as I know, and I don't remember my mom ever playing the piano again.

I never knew until after my Dad's funeral, that Artie's death was so painful for him, he never let my mom say his name in the house. The night before he went into the hospital (and never came out again), Daddy watched the documentary on Artie.... he died several days later.

Another thing that tore my Dad up was a comment that the military representative said to my Dad at Artie's funeral. It was meant as the highest of compliments - that Artie 'was who he was because of my Dad'but unfortunately, my Dad took it as HE was responsible for Artie going into the Army instead of taking either one of his legitimate deferment options... and therefore HE was responsible for Artie's death.

I never discussed how hard of a time I was having dealing with the loss of 'my big brother' because everyone else seemed to be healing OK and I didn't want to 'scratch any scabs off'. After he was killed, I was angry at God because there had been TWO times I came very close to being hit by a car in two different incidents... WHY was I spared... I, who was no one, who had no direction in life/no foresight to my future/a "nothing" ...when Artie who WAS everything, had a wife and two beautiful baby girls (who needed a daddy), had a high powered chemical engineering degree from Notre Dame and a high powered future with Texaco Oil Company and who everyone NEEDED in their life* - why did God take him and not me? I should have died and Artie would have been HOME on leave for MY funeral. I carried a lot of guilt around for a lot of years over that thought.

*I wasn't the only one whose life was centered around Art - he was the heart of our family.

'After', I was going to school in Dillon, Montana where Artie's widow Helen lived with the two babies. That's where I got to know her and become close with her. I was privy to some things through her. She and I would talk about Artie. While she did eventually remarry, she told me she would NEVER forget Artie... and her two children she had with her new husband (and her subsequent grandchildren) were raised knowing about "Daddy Art". While Kerry Lynn remembered her dad - she had been about 18 months old - the youngest daughter Amy was born after Artie was in Vietnam. She never really felt a connection to Art (I think she felt that was Kerry's heritage to treasure - all the pictures were of Artie and Kerry, Amy wasn't born vet to be in any photos with him)... until part of her senior class took a trip to DC and the Wall. She had her fingers on Artie's name when her teacher came up and asked if it was someone she knew. Amy said, 'Yes, it's my Dad'. No one even knew that her step dad wasn't her real dad until then. I think that's the first she ever really felt a true connection... or claimed her connection.

A commitment I took on when I returned to the classroom in 2006, was on each Veteran's Day and Memorial Day, speak to my students and tell them Artie's story... and remind them that war is not glamorous, that there is pain that sometimes never goes away... and some one paid the price for the freedoms and life they often take for granted.

A commitment I took on when I returned to the classroom in 2006, was on each Veteran's Day and Memorial Day, speak to my students and tell them Artie's story...

I usually cry the whole day but I feel it's important that there NEVER be a repeat of how the soldiers were treated when they came back from Vietnam! (There has only been one Veterans' Day that I wimped out and stayed home from school rather than face the day and the telling of the story.) Kathleen and I partake in one of Libby's Memorial Day ceremonies at the cemetery laying the Gold Star Mother's wreath on behalf of Mom. I do the presentation of Artie's scholarship at school each year and, being in school - seeing the students up close and personal - help select a student that most exemplifies Artie.

In the West 57th Street broadcast, Art's widow Helen recalls: "After Art graduated from NCO school at Fort Sill there was a party. I remember very clearly looking at all these guys and thinking out of this bunch someone's not going to come back. I wonder who it's going to be? I never, ever thought it would be Art.

Art wrote me in a letter that one night he was on guard duty on top of the Howitzer with the machine gun in his hand wondering 'Why am I doing this?' He wasn't a killer, he wasn't a soldier – he was an engineer. (About the movie and the name) It bothers me, the name is my family. Art was not a violent person. Those movies appeal to the very basic instincts in people – the desire for revenge.

(Initially informed on Nov 27 that SSGT Rambo was listed as Missing In Action, the family held out hope that Art was alive. Helen and Art's parents were visiting friends, Mr. & Mrs. Robert Sullivan, parents of 2LT David Sullivan who was killed in action Sep 5, 1968) *Three soldiers came to the door. It was a nightmare for us but for the Sullivans it was like living it all over again.*"

Howard Rambo is a WWII vet (Regarding the Rambo movies): "Nobody ever saw anything like that in the war and why they ever made a story like that I'll never know. I saw 'First Blood' and that took about all I could stand. (On Art's death) When it first happened you thought about it all the time – I kind of trained myself to think of something else. You think of it less and less after...and the pain eases a little bit. They say time heals all wounds - I don't think that's 100%."

Viola Rambo was Art's mother: (On Art's death) "We always accepted it and we've never been bitter. People say 'How can you not be bitter?' Bitterness would only hurt us and there's three other kids. On our trip back East, every time we checked in somewhere they'd comment about the name and ask 'Is there a tough guy out in the car?'"

Dan Rambo (Ontario, Canada) was Art's younger brother by ~7 years: "I'd like to meet Stallone. I'd like to ask him why he's doing it besides the obvious reasons. Maybe he doesn't even know it – about this family. Of all the thousands and thousands of people who were killed in Vietnam, there is only one Rambo...and his middle name is John."

At Libby High School, over fifty-five years have passed since Art Rambo attended classes there, but through the efforts of his family - and Patty Rambo in particular - the "Arthur John Rambo Memorial Scholarship" is presented every year to the student that "...exhibits the best grasp regarding the concept of patriotism. Traits taken into consideration are character, academics and service". In Patty Rambo's words: "In the sense that this is a memorial, I feel you should know the person in whose memory this scholarship is awarded. Art Rambo grew up south of Libby, in the country doing farm chores, swimming in Libby Creek, hunting and fishing...absorbing life and living it to its fullest in small town America. He went through the Libby School system, graduating in the Top Ten of his class.

He had been guaranteed a draft deferment based on parental as well as occupational status. Texaco wanted to fight to keep him where he was. Artie wouldn't let them. In part, due to the draft protesters and chaos that was happening at the time, in part to being the man he was becoming...and possibly, in part to the song he sang at Carroll College as Sir Lancelot which asked 'who will stand up, who will take the lead?' Sir Lancelot said 'C'est Moi' – 'it is I. I will stand up and take the responsibility'.

What's patriotism? It's serving your country – but not just in a military capacity. It involves how you live your life on a daily basis – at whatever your assignment is at the moment... Be it as a student, a parent, a productive member of society – no matter what capacity...how you serve your family, how you serve your community. Remember that the freedom we enjoy today... these freedoms we possibly take for granted...these freedoms take a conscious commitment and hard work from each citizen just to maintain and preserve."

"Remember that freedom is not free."

• Art's wife Helen Ryan Rambo Christensen died April 27, 2018.

• Art's parents, Howard and Viola are both deceased.

• Sisters Kathy Bache and Patty Rambo live in Libby, Montana. Both have attended 11th ACVVC Reunions.

• Brother Dan Rambo lives in Ontario, Canada and frequently attends our reunions, most recently in 2019 accompanied by his son Art Rambo.

• SSGT Arthur John Rambo was the only member of the Howitzer Battery awarded a Silver Star. He was the last Trooper from the Howitzer to be killed in action.

• Art Rambo's story is one of 730 stories of young men who wore the Blackhorse patch and died in Vietnam.

Art is buried in Libby Cemetery. Rest in peace
Art.

Heroes of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment

In July 2019 a new book was published that honors many of the Blackhorse troopers who served in Vietnam. The book "Heroes of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment During the Vietnam War" is hailed as the most complete collection of the nations highest awards earned by Blackhorse Troopers of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment during the Vietnam War.

This book includes the names and citations for the 3 Medals of Honor, 29 Distinguished Service Crosses, 1 Distinguished Service Medal, 463 Silver Stars, 11 Legions of Merit, 269 Distinguished Flying Crosses and 89 Soldier's Medals awarded to members of the Regiment in the Vietnam War. It includes a history of the Regiment and concludes with Appendixes that analyze awards by criteria such as Rank, MOS, Troop/Squadron, Month/Year, and Hometown. It also includes a listing of the 730 Blackhorse Troopers who died or were killed in action in Vietnam.

This book is a result of several years of research at the National Archives in College Park, Maryland, and other sources. It is estimated that the book contains at least 95 percent of the nations highest awards earned by Blackhorse troopers in Vietnam.

There were countless acts of valor and heroism by Blackhorse troopers that occurred every day in Vietnam. There are another 3,000 citations for Bronze Star Medals for Valor and Army Commendation Medals for Valor that are available, equal to another 4 books of this size. This particular book contains the citations for those troopers who earned the nations highest awards for valor.

This is a book that every Blackhorse trooper should have. The detailed accounts of valor are a reflection of the personal bravery and courage of these and all Blackhorse troopers and of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment.

The recording ends with Patton saying "I'll just never have an experience like this again...I'm sick of this war a little, but leaving this unit is tough. It's tough. And I can't describe it more than that." If you get chance to read the story or hear the PBS broadcast/podcast, don't miss it.

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SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM UPDATE

Important New Information

Beginning in 2020, scholarship applicants will be divided into two categories: those who plan to enroll or are enrolled in colleges and universities; and those who plan to enroll or are enrolled in a trade school or a community college vocational program. The same percentage of scholarships will be given to each group of students. For example: in 2020, if we are able to give 30% of the applicants a scholarship then 30% of each group of students would receive a scholarship. Both groups of students will use the same application which can be found in this issue of Thunder Run or on our website. This is an updated application form and must be used by all applicants applying for scholarships in 2020. Please contact me if you have questions.

The 11th ACVVC Scholarship Program has awarded 536 scholarships totaling \$1,715,000 to the children and grandchildren of our membership since its inception in 1996! Every scholarship dollar paid to these deserving scholarship winners was donated by YOU, the members of this great association of Blackhorse combat veterans!

Our Scholarship Guide provides more information on the scholarship process and contains detailed assistance on completing the scholarship application. You can print a copy of the Guide and the Application at www.11thcavnam.com. If you have a child or grandchild who is planning on attending a college, community college or trade school this fall, please encourage them to apply for a scholarship (application deadline 05/15/2020).

Beginning in 2008, each recipient's Scholarship Award has been dedicated to honor a specific 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Trooper who was Killed in Action (KIA) in Vietnam or Cambodia. The Blackhorse KIAs honored each year are selected on an impartial and random basis. An attractive certificate suitable for framing containing information about the trooper in whose honor their scholarship is dedicated is sent to each recipient.

In addition, each year, one recipient is selected to receive a special Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Leadership Scholarship award in honor of former 11th ACVVC President Chuck Schmidt for his leadership and devotion to the 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Troopers of the

dren of our membership since its inception in 1996!

Vietnam War. Chuck died on Veterans Day 2007 as a result Agent Orange-related cancer shortly after being elected to his third term as President. Chuck's widow, Mrs. Bonnie Schmidt, selects the recipient of this award from the list of scholarship winners.

A Scholarship applicant must fall into one of the following categories:

1. A child or grandchild of an 11th Armored Cavalry Trooper who was Killed In Action (KIA) in Vietnam or Cambodia.

2. A child or grandchild of a deceased life member of the 11th ACVVC.

3. A child or grandchild of a current life member of the 11th ACVVC in good standing.

"Child" is defined as a natural born, adopted or step-child "Grandchild" is defined as a natural born, adopted or step-grandchild.

Additional Criteria

1. The applicant must have maintained a minimum Grade Point Average of 3.0 during the last two years of high school (or college if applicable).

2. The applicant must be a high school graduate (by fall semester 2020).

Graduate and doctoral level students are not eligible.

2020 scholarship winners will receive an award of \$3000. The Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Leadership Scholarship award winner will receive \$5000. All scholarship awards are sent directly to the school the recipient is attending.
