August 3rd, 4th & 5th, 2001 will be the dates that will cap off a year of celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the 11th U.S. Cavalry. Troopers and families attending this special reunion will see first hand living history of our unit and many of the men who made our unit so special.

Earlier celebrations took place at Las Vegas and Ft. Irwin and also at the Vietnam Memorial in Washington on February 02.

We are expecting many of our former commanders, officers and enlisted to be on hand. Attending will be troopers who served with the 11th Cavalry in Europe (WWII); Germany, before Vietnam; Vietnam/ Cambodia; Germany after Vietnam; Desert Storm and many of our fine soldiers who currently are serving our great Regiment at Ft. Irwin, CA. We will be holding a special ceremony on Ft. Myer, and a memorial service at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

At the banquet dinner, we will have a special ceremony whereby all of our battle streamers will be placed on our colors.



Melody Lark Annis found the camaraderie of Blackhorse Troopers truly amazing. Unfortunately, the buddy that was with her brother in the last moments, did not attend the reunion, but has been in contact with her via email. Our Honored Guests were truly

An article in the latest issue of *VFW magazine* titled "Daring Capture In the Philippines, a Turning Point of the War," is a reference to the 11th Volunteer Cavalry, the predecessor of the 11th U.S. Cavalry formed in 1902. The article was about the Philippines War (1899-1902) that had dragged on for two years whereby the American public was tiring of this little guerilla war.

The commander, Brig. Gen. Frederick Funston devised a plan to end the fighting. He would attempt to capture the rebel leader with a small, hand-picked team behind enemy lines and capture the rebel leader, Emilio Aguinaldo. Capturing Aguinaldo would end the war. With 81 Macabebe Scouts and four of his best officers, two of which were brothers with the 11th Vol. Cav, he captured Aguinaldo, thus ending the war. The two brothers of the 11th Vol. Cav were: Capt. Russell T. and Lt. Oliver P.M. Hazzard

BGen Tom White nominated for Secretary of Army

As our newsletter goes to print, we have been notified that former Blackhorse Trooper Tom White has been nominated for Secretary of the Army by the President, George W. Bush. The following is a portion of the news release:

White House Press Release

President George W. Bush today announced his intention to nominate four individuals to serve in his administration.

The President intends to nominate Thomas E. White to be Secretary of the Army. He is currently the Vice-Chairman of Enron Energy Services. He has served as Chairman and CEO of Enron Operations Corporation and as Chairman and CEO of Enron Power Corporation since joining Enron in 1990. After 23 years, White retired from the U.S. Army as a Brigadier General. He served as Executive Assistant to General Colin Powell while he served as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff from 1989 to 1990 and served as Director of the Armor/Anti-Armor Special Task Force in the Office of the Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army. He is a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and the War College.

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Old US Highway 66. Does that say anything to you? It sure does to me. Many call it America's driveway for (or something like that). It cuts across the "heartland" of America from Los Angeles to Chicago through the Midwestern breadbasket farm states. When I was a kid we traveled it from L.A. to Oklahoma to see my dad's family out on the wheat farm where he was raised. My dad was a dust bowl Okie who rode the rails and migrated along 66 to California during the Depression. Many of you have traveled it too. I would guess that you're probably old enough to remember the black and white TV series, "Hiway 66." It was about two young guys in their Corvette who had many adventures along that old highway before the interstates replaced it.

To me, Viet Nam Highway QL 13 is a reminder of Highway US 66. Know what I mean? A lot happened along US 66 in those days that I'll always remember. Same with QL13 in Viet Nam. Some would say the same of Highway 1 that went through Xuan Loc to Da Nang and points north. I was never on it myself, except for one quick trip to Blackhorse Base Camp when I came into country. I went up to Quan Loi right away and never came back. Anyway, a lot of Blackhorse history took place along QL13. We even named our 11th ACVVC paper "Thunder Run" in honor of the name we dubbed QL13. I guess the Blackhorse passing through was like the roar of thunder in a heavy monsoon. Right? The convoys, the noise, the ambushes, the dust (eating dirt - remember?), the mud, the outposts, the mama-sans, the Lambrettas and red Honda 50s, the villages, the fields of fire (clearings made that way by Agent Orange), the rubber trees, the mines, the bridges, the arc lights in the distance, the twisted French railroad tracks that ran beside the highway. I think thunder run had been a beautiful highway before war and Agent Orange. It's probably beautiful again now.

I think QL13 started somewhere down around Saigon. I know we convoyed once from Loc Ninh to Di An and took QL 13 through Lai Khe to get there. Anyway, let's talk about those French railroad tracks I mentioned. Remember how twisted and

pathetic they looked? They were torn apart and laying alongside QL13 like the ghost of a former age, a lost war, an old culture that would never come back. Whether that was good or bad, who knows? Still, I used to look at those old tracks and wonder about life along that antique railroad in it's heyday. I imagined those French narrow gauge trains running and carrying people and stuff all over Southeast Asia. Some people I know think we ended up like the French, leaving with our tails between our legs. I don't buy that myself. I believe the place is a lot better now than it would have been if we hadn't come along. That's saying a lot because so much craziness happened over there. Still does, only not as bad as it was right after we left. Check the people these days. Check how they love American GIs, even now. Take a trip over there and you'll see. Check how they love jeans and American tourists. Check how they love American music. Check how they love American ideals like wanting freedom to come into the 20th (or 21st) century. Check how they want to learn computers and English, American English. W didn't count for anything? We didn't make the place better? Sure we did. (I'll stop this now because I'm getting in deeper than I want).

Some of you were along one day when our Combat Engineers were mine sweeping QL13 down from Loc Ninh and up from Quan Loi. QL13 was a busy highway in that area. The Vietnamese were very impatient people. They were in a hurry to get places. Our mine sweepers were slow because they were on foot, of course. This slowed traffic considerably. Then we had to stop to repair a culvert under the road which the VC had blown the night before. We brought up an AVLB to lay across the culvert so traffic could go by while our engineers laid a new culvert. Trouble came when the Vietnamese which had backed up behind our guys got impatient. They decided they couldn't wait for us to clear the road of mines. I don't remember every detail, but I do remember that seven of those colorful Vietnamese

busses passed us by in a mighty hurry. They just couldn't wait for the road to be cleared. You guessed it. We looked up after a few minutes. About a mile ahead we could see an explosion. We knew what it was. Somebody had hit a mine. We couldn't get up there to help them very fast because we still had to clear the road. Before we got to the explosion site, we found three more mines in the road. When we got to the site we saw that the third bus in line had hit the fourth mine in the road. The other busses and traffic were very fortunate. They all should have been blown to smithereens. But they weren't. Only one bus got it. The other busses, trucks and Lambrettas got off clean. The mined bus had casualties all over the place which I don't need to describe. Pretty soon families got the word and came down from Loc Ninh. Not a fun time.

There are plenty of fine memories of Thunder Run, of course. Yes, there are many good memories from Viet Nam. Like the day we came out of Cambodia. Were you there? We'd been in Cambodia for exactly two months. (Which is why we're called 11th ACR Vets of Viet Nam and Cambodia). President Nixon had finally allowed our side to go into that Communist sanctuary. He gave us two months to do what we could to take it out. Our guys did a lot considering that it was years late and we only had two months. I admit our troopers didn't take out 100% like we wanted, but our side sure did slow down the communist side. We could have cleaned up the whole mess, but our political side decided to "negotiate" instead. But never mind that. QL13 was still our way out of Cambodia. Not the way in. The Fish Hook was the way in. Coming out was a lot easier than going in had been. It was a pretty cheerful day, actually, as I recall. We came out of Cambodia and just kept on moving. We went on past Loc Ninh, past Quan Li, past Lai Khe and past a lot of old ambush and firefight sites too. Funny thing, we went on past engineers that were actually paving over QL13. Guess it wouldn't be Thunder Run any more. At least there wouldn't be so much thunder. Our days in the AO were over. We were going down to beat the bush around Long Binh and then start phasing out of country altogether. Took a couple more

years, but it happened.

So, a lot happened along QL13, Thunder Run. There are hundreds of stories that could be told from you troopers who made the run. Like the E Troop ambush near QL13 south of Quan Loi in August of '69 when John Sexton was taken POW - and kept locked up for 2 1/2 years in remote jungle camps in Cambodia. Or like branching off QL13 at Loc Ninh to go up QL14 to Bo Duc and Bu Dop to clear that overgrown highway so the Vietnamese could use it again. Stories about that too. Or like convoying along QL13 to go on a rare stand-down, a once-a-year, if ever, happening to get the machinery operating right again. Remember? I guess if most of the reminiscences at the reunions were just about what happened along Thunder Run, it would fill a year of talking and remembering. And for you troopers who didn't do QL13, you did Highway 1 or Another Run. Those were wild rides too.

One thing about Thunder Run, it was always a wild ride. You didn't always know how it was going to wind up, especially when you ran into an ambush or had a few RPGs aimed your way. But you sure knew where you were going when you were on that run. Off the road you could lose your way. I saw it happen. But when that track, that ACAV, M48, M548, Hog or Sheridan was running down the center of QL13, whichever direction didn't matter, you knew exactly where you were headed. It was a ride you'll remember for a lifetime. When you check the masthead of this 11thACVVC paper, you'll remember. Maybe you'll even feel a little nostalgia. Why not?

Life itself is sort of like Thunder Run, QL13. Many memories, many adventures, many experiences, many relationships. It's like riding with the Blackhorse along that Run - you can see where you're going. Just stay on the road, fix your eyes straight ahead and keep on truckin'. And when it gets to where the rubber really hits the road of life the wise trooper will examine his direction, check his map and see where he is on his Life's Run or whether he's off the course for where he wants to go. When we consider that every one of us is on the road of life and we're heading somewhere, it's wise and reasonable to check the destination of the route you're on. If you know me, you'll know I recommend taking the road that leads to life, to God. Eternal life with God your Creator. A quote from Jesus the Messiah, the Son of

God makes the life map clear: "Don't be troubled. You trust God, now trust in me. There are many rooms in my Father's home, and I am going to prepare a place for you. If this were not so, I would tell you plainly. When everything is ready, I will come and get you, so that you will always be with me where I am. And you know where I am going and how to get there. 'No we don't, Lord,' Thomas said. 'We haven't any idea where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus told him, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me.'" (John 14:1-6).

Well, QL13, Thunder Run, is full of meaning and memories. Whatever our experiences, whatever our adventures along that road, they stick with us to this day. Our lives

were changed for all time. We grew up. We learned life. We learned what life meant in very many ways. I trust and pray that, whatever our experiences along Thunder run, we are better for it. I trust and pray, in a similar way, that life and it's meaning and fullness has it's fullest meaning for each of us too. And that is in it's fullest adventure which is with God our Creator through Jesus his son keeping us in the center of the way, right on course until the very end. Allons!

God bless you. God loves you. So do I.

The origin of our Jungle Boots

I'm not the author of this information as I came across it while I was bidding on a pair of our jungle boots on ebay. The following is the description given about the boots from that bid. Oh, and yes, I did successfully win that bid. Size 8R was probably pretty common so this size is hard to find.

The army's tropical combat boot, or jungle boot, was one of the most successful clothing innovations of the Vietnam War. Its development was begun in 1955 as an attempt to overcome a major problem in the footwear used in World War II and in Korea.

Because of the failure of the Goodyear welt stitching in that footwear, the sole often separated from the boot. This problem was particularly prevalent in jungle climates, commonly occurring after a month's exposure to constant dry-wet conditions. To overcome this defect, the Army Quartermaster and Engineering Research Command adopted the vulcanized sole process, first developed in Europe.

The army's tropical combat boot, or jungle boot, was one of the most successful clothing innovations of the Vietnam War.

The first three types of direct molded sole (DMS) tropical combat boots were tested in Panama during 1960-61. The boots were styled after World War II, 1943-pattern combat boots with buckled cuff, except that a screened eyelet was added at the inside shank of each boot and a Swiss Vibram-pattern mountain-climbing sole was used.

The three types varied only in their upper materials. An all-leather, an all-nylon, and a combination style were tried. The all-leather uppers proved uncomfortably hot and heavy, and the all-nylon uppers did not provide enough support of protection against external objects. The combination style-nylon duck upper with a leather foot portion (vamp and counter-pocket) vulcanized directly to a rubber-cleated sole, was the most satisfactory and retained this superiority in all subsequent boot-designed tests.

My comment is that we still went through 2 or 3 pairs of them in our 1-year tours.

Reunion Update

■ Attention Troopers and families attending Reunion XVI

Our hotel is the HYATT REGENCY WASHINGTON ON CAPITAL HILL, 400 New Jersey Avenue NW, Washington, D.C. There are many Hyatt hotels in and around Washington. Be sure you specify this hotel when taking shuttles, taxi cabs or asking directions. Otherwise you could end up at the wrong hotel.

Transportation

(The hotel does not operate a shuttle)

From Reagan National Airport:

Reagan National Airport is closest to the hotel. Super Shuttle will get you to the hotel for \$9 one way per person. Taxi cabs start at \$9 plus (about \$12 to the hotel). Some taxicabs may charge a surcharge of 50 cents or \$1 for extra persons or baggage. Metrorail runs from National Airport to Union Station. (Hotel is 2 blocks from Union Station.) Metrorail fares vary from \$1.10 and up, depending on time of day and distance traveled. One way fare to Union Station should be under \$3. However, you must change trains at one of the transfer stations enroute.

From Dulles International Airport:

Dulles International Airport is 28 miles west of Washington. Washington Flyer Express bus (888-WASHFLY) to Union Station is \$16 oneway/\$26 round trip. (Hotel is 2 blocks from Union Station.) Washington Flyer taxicab is \$43.50 one way.

From Baltimore-Washington Airport:

Baltimore-Washington Airport (BWI) is north of Washington. Super Shuttle from BWI to hotel is \$28 for first person and \$10 for each additional person. A return shuttle is available from the hotel to BWI, \$30 for 1st person, \$5 for 2nd, 3rd and 4th person, and \$10 each additional person. You must reserve these seats in advance at the concierge desk in the hotel lobby for this returning shuttle. Amtrak (\$20 one way for the 32 minute trip) and MARC (\$5.75 for a 41 minute trip one-way) trains will take you from BWI Station to Union Station. (Hotel is 2 blocks from Union Station.)

Please note: MARC trains run on *week-days only*, there is no MARC trains service on Saturday or Sunday. There is a free shuttle between the airport terminal and BWI

railroad station.

Taxicab rates vary. Washington is surrounded by several counties in Maryland and Virginia. Each jurisdiction has its own rules. Some cabs charge by zones and others charge by miles. It is best to ask the driver for the approximate fare before entering the cab so there will be no surprises at the end of the trip.

Parking

The hotel has valet parking only. It is \$24 per night. The best deal I found was at National Airport long-term Economy parking, \$7 per 24 hours. Take shuttle, taxi or Metro to hotel. A good deal if you are driving in and just want to park the car for the duration. National airport is about 6 miles from the hotel. You may want to search the web for Washington parking lots. www.sun-park.com is one. Try looking for one near a metro station. It will save you walking or cab fare. There is parking available at Union Station.

Tours

You can arrange your own tours at the hotel concierge desk. We may try to arrange tour to Fort Meade, if possible, on Friday. The Regiment deployed to Vietnam from there in 1966. Anyone interested in such a tour should advise the reunion chairman. If there is enough interest, we will see if the folks at Fort Meade can accommodate us. There will be a fee to cover the cost of the trip. *(Those traveling by rail from BWI can see part of Fort Meade on the right side of the train a few minutes after leaving BWI Station. The train passes by the railhead at Fort Meade.)*

From the Quartermaster...

Greetings to all. The quartermaster has been kept very busy lately with a large number of orders. Keep up the good work. This issue contains a new quartermaster form. We have several new items that were tested at the last reunion and have met with approval. They are a tote bag for the ladies, a barbeque apron and a gear bag. Also we have a limited supply of the 100 year commemorative coins.

One of the things that will become apparent as you scan the order form is that some items have undergone price increases. We have put off raising prices for as long as we could. However, we are being hurt by continued price increases on the items we sell and even more so by the jump in costs to mail items through the post office. We were over 400 dollars in the red on the cost of shipping and handling as opposed to what we charge for same. For example, in my last mailing there were three packages that required postage of \$10.44, \$11.71 and \$13.60 This comes to \$35.75. We took in \$15.00(3x 5.00). So on postage alone, we lost \$20.75 plus the cost of the packaging which was at least another \$6.00 This example is just so you can understand that we are not raising prices capriciously. We have to

average our shipping costs so that over the year we reach a break-even point.

We are still doing our best to bring you items at the lowest prices that we can and still provide a slight profit margin to the organization for our commitments like the scholarship fund.

The one thing that I can guarantee you is that my cost to you for running the quartermaster store will not increase. It was \$0 00 for the last year just like every year before that! My labor is all donated free of charge to ensure that there will continue to be a Quartermaster store for you to use. So to the several of you that have suggested we could keep prices down by my taking less profit, all I have to say is that if I cut \$0 by 100% it is still \$0.

I would like to remind you that old forms will not be accepted after 04-01-01. Please make sure you use the updated form. Also take time to check your order and ensure that the addition is correct and that you are sending it to the correct location. I do QM forms not membership, and if you send QM forms to membership they have no way to process them. Avoid delays and lost forms by mailing them to the correct address.
