oung Ethan Larimer has always dreamed of joining the Army and following in the footsteps of his father, Daniel Larimer, who was a "Blackhorse Trooper," as soldiers of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment are known.

However, Ethan has a unique neurological disorder — Charcot-Marie-Tooth neuropathy type 4J, or CMT4J — that will prevent him from joining the military. Because of his medical condition, Ethan has difficulty with motor functions and uses a wheelchair.

"Ethan has dealt with his disease very

well," said Daniel Larimer. "He has been hospitalized for weeks on end at times as well as continuous physical therapy. One thing Ethan has taught me is that even if you have some barriers or limitations, that doesn't need to be your life."

Though Ethan will never be able to serve in the Army due to his disability, he still dreams of riding into battle on the back of tanks. When Ethan's mother, Victoria Perkins, contacted the 11th Armored Cavalry about fulfilling Ethan's

There were several reasons for my decision, one of which is that I'll be 73 this year. In the past year I've realized that I'm not getting any younger. I've devoted much of my personal time to the organization over these years and I have loved every day, but I also have a family. I'm so blessed to have a wife who has supported and encouraged me throughout the years. I have three grandchildren who are involved in many activities. I've found that it's becoming more difficult to balance my personal life with my family and my commitment to the organization.

This would have been my last year as President. Four years ago I talked with the board about my intentions to serve through 2018. Earlier this year at our board meeting I talked again about my intentions to finish this term and not run again for President. I originally planned to finish my term but it just didn't turn out that way.

I thank each of you for your help and support throughout my term. I look back at the accomplishments this organization has made since that first reunion in 1986. It's because of the support of our members that this organization is what it is today. I am so proud to have been a part of it all.

I'm not going far. I'll still be involved with membership and Operation Embrace. I plan to continue to attend reunions. I'll just scale back a bit.

I'll close this article as I have always done for many years by saying, "Always give thanks to the men and women in uniform who serve our nation each and every day". To our members, Welcome Home, it's good to be "Together Again"."

dream, the famed Blackhorse Regiment was happy to oblige.

Ethan recently spent a day with soldiers of the 11th Armored Cavalry, who helped Ethan check off all the items on his bucket list. Upon arrival to Regimental Headquarters, Ethan was inducted into the Blackhorse Honorary Rolls, an honor set aside for those who have served the regiment above reproach. The regimental commander then presented Ethan with the Regimental Command Team coins. Ethan was able to see demonstrations of several guns, including the M240B Machine Gun, Browning M2 .50 Cal. Machine Gun, M249 Squad Automatic Weapon, and M4A1 Carbine. He also got to drive his wheelchair into a tank and see a helicopter.

"Through his diagnosis and living with CMT4J, Ethan has shown great resiliency," said Col. Joseph Clark, Regiment Commander, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. "My interaction with Ethan was inspiring, because he maintains positivity, and refuses to allow his disability to stop him. Throughout the day, he was curious and asked many questions about what we do. His personality, his drive, and his grit is exactly what I look for in my troopers, and I am honored to have made him a Blackhorse Trooper."

Ethan was given a personal "Box Tour," an event where people are shown the ins and outs of training and battles at the National Training Center in Irvine, California. Then he led a platoon during building clearance drills through the streets of "Razish," a simulated town at NTC.

Later the 11th Armored Cavalry's Horse Detachment gave Ethan a tour of the stables and brought some of the horses out to greet the young Blackhorse Trooper. The Horse Detachment conducted a special demonstration for Ethan and his family to mark the end of Ethan's day.

"Even though I am no longer a service member, the post and the unit I was a part of really pulled out all the stops to accommodate my son," said Daniel. "We are all really grateful to come back and see what the Blackhorse has become and to hear 'Allons' again."

We Need To Talk.....

F (Vietnam) and it seems almost like it was yesterday. Not a day passes that is free of some thought about the war. It's amazing how easily I can be transported back in time, how easily my memories of that time can be triggered. After all of this time my memories remain fresh.

When I came home from Vietnam nobody ever asked me what I did in the war. My parents never asked me, and my neighbors, church congregation, non-veteran friends and acquaintances never asked me anything about the war. I don't think any of them ever really wanted to know what I or any of us had actually done or been through in the war. Most had watched the war on television but they just didn't want to know what my (our) part in all of this death and destruction might have been, particularly since many of them didn't support our actions there. It might offend their sensibilities and ideas of who we were once, or what they thought we might be capable of. It hinted of a place we might have gone in our thoughts and actions that was counter to the values and ideas that most of us were raised with, and threatened their perspective on the peaceful, relatively non-violent environments we had all been raised in. The idea that we might be an actual killer returned to the peaceful web of life as they knew it seemed to threaten the safety of the lives they were living. Besides, asking somebody if they ever killed someone in the war is not a polite question. Thev didn't really want to know, and they were afraid if you said yes, it would mean you were not only capable of killing then... .. you might be capable of killing now, and that's a frightening prospect for them. They're afraid you might snap. That takes you far beyond the you they used to know; the you they never use to think would be capable of such a thing. So, is it really surprising they don't talk to us about our experiences?

It's funny that today when people meet a veteran they often thank them for their service, (It sure wasn't like that for returning Vietnam veterans) but still nobody really talks to us about what it was really like. They just expect us to come home and pickup our lives where we left off as if nothing had happened to us. It doesn't occur to them that maybe we need to talk about our experiences. We need to talk to try and understand the unimaginable violence, death, destruction, poverty, and societal destruction we had witnessed. We need to reconcile our own actions and find peace with the things our country asked us to do. We were all wounded to some extent by our experiences, and talking through them with someone who will listen is powerful medicine for our souls.

As veterans we find it difficult to talk to folks that haven't shared the same kind of experiences. How can our friends and family members understand something we have

2018 Election

Five positions will be up for election this year during the General Membership Meeting to be held Saturday morning, September 8th, during the 2018 Reunion. The five positions are President, the unexpired term of the Vice President, Secretary, Director, for a full term and the unexpired term of a Director.

The President and Secretary will serve two-year terms. The full term Director will serve a three-year term. The President, Secretary and full term Director's terms will begin January 1, 2019. The unexpired Vice President and Director terms began January 1, 2018 and will end December 31, 2020.

All candidates must be Life Members of the 11th ACVVC. Candidates will have an equal opportunity to state their qualifications at the General Membership Meeting. The elected candidates must be able to attend the annual reunion and two Board Meetings each year of their elected term.

The elected candidates must be able to communicate by e-mail with the other Board members and be able to help the Board make decisions on a variety of organizational matters. Each candidate must be highly organized and be able to commit time and energy to a specific project or committee as directed by the President. SERGEANTS: A TRIBUTE

ost anybody who's ever served will tell you that Sergeants run the Army. Generals and Captains notwithstanding, the day-to-day Army functions with Sergeants at the helm. The decisions your Sergeants made probably determined how your day was going to go.

I'll bet you remember your drill sergeant from basic. I sure do: SFC Vega-Padro, a Puerto Rican veteran of the Korean War. He was a good guy, but with limited English. Seemed like at Saturday morning inspection he knew only two words: "rusty" and "dusty". So of course, that's what us recruits called him: SGT Rusty-Dusty.

Next platoon over had SFC Shenan, an Irish guy, also a 2nd ID veteran. Here was a man born to be a drill sergeant. He didn't march, he strutted. He lived for dismounted drill. Knew every Jody cadence there was. Loved his job. Carried a swagger stick everywhere he went, we didn't know why; a black foot-long thing with a silver bullet on the end. At Ft. Ord in the summer of '59, he made an unforgettable impression.

Later on, the actions of two other Sergeants would change everything for me. Both men made decisions for which I will be forever grateful; one of them arguably saved my life.

Spring of 1960, at Ft. Gordon, GA: I was an MP, a member of the 504th MP Battalion. We were a STRAC unit, (Strategic Army Corps), charged with being able to go anywhere worldwide within hours. Although we were all MP-qualified, the battalion felt like Infantry with Military Police helmets, armbands, and M1911A1 pistols. A PFC with less than one year in, and subject to the vagaries of the duty roster, I was on KP one day, washing pots and pans. Late in the morning the Company Jerk, er, Clerk, came through and said, "Any of you guys not yet married, and not yet 21, are eligible to go to the post theater this afternoon to see a presentation about West Point." I knew a little about what that school was from the 50's TV show by the same name. So, I said to SSG Beals, the Mess Sergeant, can I go? He thought for a minute. He had every right to say no, you've got work to do here, we're too busy, etc. But something made him say OK.

Off I went to the theater. Some Captain, a

Later on, the actions of two other Sergeants would change everything for me. Both men made decisions for which I will be forever grateful; one of them arguably saved my life.

West point graduate, showed a film about the place and said to several hundred of us, sign this form if you're interested. I did. Then followed physical exams, psychological tests, and a one-year assignment to the Army's West Point Prep School, (USMAPS), then at Fort Belvoir, VA. I received an appointment thru the Regular Army, and graduated from West Point in 1965. None of this would have happened were it not for SSG Beals' decision on a warm morning in the B Company mess hall, a moment that changed my life.

Fast forward to the fall of '66: the 3rd Squadron, 11th ACR has arrived in Vietnam and is moving in to their first base camp at Long Binh. The 173rd Airborne Brigade was nearby at Bien Hoa, and they had set up a weapons test range which we requested to borrow. I was the XO of 3rd How, responsible for the firing battery. We trundled over to Bien Hoa and proceeded to test fire all our small arms. A grenadier fired his 40mm launcher, but the round was a dud. Maybe it didn't go far enough to arm. With the wisdom and good sense possessed by all newlyminted 2LT's, I determined that we should not leave with that dud on the range and that I would toss a hand grenade into the vicinity of the unexploded round to set it off.

Pulling the pin, and gripping the grenade

in my right hand, I prepared to execute my plan. As I reared back in preparation for an overhand toss, SSG Hebert, one of the six gun chiefs in our battery and stationed to my right, said, "LT, watch out for that tree branch." Sure enough, I had not noticed a tree limb directly in the path of my throw. Without the Sergeant's warning, the grenade would have surely dropped a few feet from all of us, and who knows what catastrophe might have resulted? It's not a stretch to say he saved my life. SSG Hebert's decision to speak up likely saved a lot of lives that day, and I am everlastingly thankful to him.

Had a hip replacement a while ago, and the rehab is walking. No physical therapy, just walking. Bored, I'd think up marching songs to pass the time. I thought of SFC Shenan, and wished I'd made this one up in "59. I sang:

SGT Shehan has a stick, Honey, honey, It's long and black but not so thick, Babe, Babe, SGT Shenan's swagger stick, It's ten times longer than his finger, Honey, Oh Baby Mine.

How did you think that song was going to end?

Double deck Pinochle. Haven't played it since the Blackhorse pulled out of Phu Loi in March of 1972. But a few days before that final road march to Long Bien with a small remnant of the last remaining 11th Cavalry troopers and the few vehicles not turned over to the ARVNs, I had a chance. I think it was Sergeant Jordan and Chief Jose Ulloa who invited me to play. I was touched. But then again, I didn't really trust them. Second only to our Deputy Squadron Commander, Major Paul Foley, no one liked to pull my chain like First Sergeant Jordan. Once there, I found out it was for money and realized they thought the chaplain an easy mark. Not so Laddies! Those Pinochle games were relief moments and still among my better memories of Vietnam. I didn't win often though I played a good game. Certainly, I was a poor match for those card counting wizards, but luckily the pairings rotated.

I'll not forget those experiences. They were simply relaxing moments without sound and fury, thundering guns or flashing parachute flares, it was *camaraderie*. I can still smile thinking about those games of 46 years ago. The guttural, sometimes profane and easily forgettable banter at that wobbly table by-passed rank and seniority, religious confessions and diverse cultures, it was sincere, jovial and honest.

Some of you old soldiers might laugh at me for classifying those games as sentimental; but then you are the same crowd who cry when Victor McLaughlin is sent to the brig in *She Wore a Yellow Ribbon*. We played no more than three times with different characters to my left or right and across the table and I wish I could remember all their names. During one game, someone confessed in front of all that playing cards was like praying. At first we laughed and I noted that it sounded like an excuse for not going to church. But later as I walked back to my chapel-office-bunk, I recalled a song I had heard in my youth. It was called: *A Deck of Cards*.

I first heard the song in the 1940's after World War II. Memory tells me it was playing on a late night radio station: WWVA from Wheeling, West Virginia. I think it was on the "The Grand Ole Opry." The name of the singer (really narrator) immediately caught my attention; he was T. Texas Tyler. Gosh, as a 10 year old I thought "now isn't that a great name." The story had such an impact on me, that almost 70 years later I can still remember most of the lyrics.

About a dozen years ago, walking the streets of Nashville with my wife, I found a record of the same song by Bill Anderson on "Honky Tonk Row." I was surprised; had to buy it and bring it home. Not quite the same impact, so I'm still searching for the original. But I do have all the words now and thought you too might enjoy them or ... even use them as an excuse for skipping church some Sunday.

T. Texas Tyler's story was about "soldier boys" who arrived in a town after long days on the march and were order to go to During one game, someone confessed in front of all that playing cards was like praying. At first we laughed and I noted that it sounded like an excuse for not going to church.

the chapel. During the service one lad was playing with a deck of cards instead of using a prayer book and was sent to the Provost. When asked to explain himself before he was sent to the brig for playing cards in church, the lad explained to the Provost Marshall that he meant no disrespect.

"Well sir," T. Texas Tyler began his narration, "I have been on the march for about six months and I had neither a Bible nor a prayer book, only a deck of cards to use for my prayers."

"You see, sir, when I look at the Ace, it reminds me that there is but one God. And the deuce reminds me that the Bible is divided into two parts: the Old and New Testaments. When I see the trey, I think of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. And when I see the four, I think of the four evangelists who preached the Gospel: there was Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

And when I see the five, it reminds me of the five wise virgins who trimmed their lamps; there were ten of them: five were wise and were saved, five were foolish and were shut out. When I see the six, it reminds me that in six days God made this heaven and earth. And when I see the seven it reminds me that on the seventh day, God rested from his great work.

And the eight, well there were eight righteous persons that God saved when he destroyed the earth: there was Noah, his wife, their sons and their wives. The nine reminds me of the lepers our Savior cleansed, and that nine of the ten didn't even thank him. When I see the ten, I think of the Ten Commandments that God handed down to Moses on a tablet of stone.

When I see the King, it reminds me that there is but one king of Heaven, God Almighty. And the Queen, well I think of the Blessed Virgin Mary who is the Queen of Heaven. And the Jack or Knave is the Devil.

When I count the number of spots in a deck of cards, I find 365, the number of days in a year. There are 52 cards, the number of weeks in a year. There are four suits, the number of weeks in a month. There are twelve picture cards, the number of months in a year. There are thirteen tricks, the number of weeks in a quarter.

So you see, sir, my deck of cards serves me as a Bible, an almanac and a prayer book"

And at the end of the record, T. Texas Tyler concludes: "And friends, this story is true. I know ... I was that soldier."

You were that soldier as well. Don't know if you prayed using a deck of cards. Don't know if you prayed at all. But I'm willing to bet when someone yelled "incoming," you really did.

The purpose of the Reunion Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is to assist Troopers who served with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in Vietnam and Cambodia, and family members of our troopers killed in action in Vietnam and Cambodia, to attend a reunion sponsored by the 11th ACVVC. Qualified applicants will be given one or more of the following items, depending on the number of requests, funds depletion, and the degree of assistance required:

1. A hotel room for one or two nights during the reunion weekend.

2. Transportation funds for fuel for auto, airfare tickets or bus or train.

3. Registration fee.

4. Meals or food allowance.

Funds are collected through direct donations by our members and are accounted for by the Treasurer. The Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is a separate account and published in the 11th ACVVC financial reports.

To be considered for financial assistance from the fund to attend a reunion of the 11th ACVVC, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as parents, siblings, children, widows) making the request must:

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and

2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's

service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the11th ACR.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation. In addition, the Trooper may be required to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC. The Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC will decide by a majority vote on whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or survivor of a KIA.

Requests must be submitted no later than to July 14, 2018.

The Search For The Yano, 528

fter reading the article "The 'Yano' Comes Home" by Sherri Bratt in 3rd quarter 2007 Thunder Run and noting that it contained inaccurate information concerning the rediscovery of that aircraft, I contacted the Editor of Thunder Run and was encouraged to write this article containing accurate information about the relocation of the 528 which we now know as the Yano. Being an active part of the search and rediscovery of the 528, I am able to portray a first hand, credible rendering of this saga.

Searching and Finding the Yano, 528.

After spending many hours, days and months on the internet I was given a source to possibly track and find out what became of my old Gun Ship 528. While talking with a good friend and webmaster for B Co/158th Avn., Dave Mussey, about my search he gave me the name of the Viet Nam Helicopter Historian, Gary Roush, of the Vietnam Helicopter Pilots' Association (VHPA). Gary Roush has compiled a database of most, if not all Helicopters flown during the Viet Nam years. The information contained here is nothing short of amazing. This database was the source that finally enabled me to track and ultimately find my UH-1, the 528. Ironically, it was right here, near where I worked, at Oro Grande Base Camp, New Mexico. I had often looked at these old helicopters but never dreamed mine had been among them. So, finally after tracking it in the database, I found that the 528 was located at Yuma Proving Ground, Arizona.

Saving The Yano, 528.

In January, 2000 I contacted Rick Douglas at Yuma Proving Ground in Arizona to verify that he, in fact, had possession of 528. After introductions by email I found Rick to be very interested and cooperative concerning my desire to visit and actually experience seeing this old war bird. He told me it had a destiny to wind up as a target for aerial gunnery in the near future but he would hold off on this Huey until I could get there. I continued to work with Rick at Yuma and Brian Howard at the War Planes Museum, New York to acquire 528 as a donation to that museum. Gary Roush had introduced me to Brian as the Curator at War Planes and the person I should work with directly.

I made my trip to Yuma on May 19, 2000 to actually make visual and physical contact with my old Gun Ship no matter what condition it was in. Chuck Wullenjohn, Public Affairs Office, came out and conducted an interview and published an article, "Comrades in Arms" about my reunion with 528 in the Yuma Daily Sun. I also met Mike Thompson, Yuma Museum Director, who was also extremely helpful with this recovery. After my visit we continued to work the donation procedures until, finally, in November, 2000 528 arrived at War Planes Museum, New York. My visit to Yuma, reunion and article can be verified by con-

tacting the Public Affairs Office at Yuma Proving Ground, Arizona. I also have copies of the article.

Transfer of the Yano from War Planes to Ft. Irwin

After the events of 9/11 in 2001 projects such as these were put on hold due to budget constraints in New York. I also had some personal issues that took me out of the loop for some time. So the events that took place in moving 528 to Ft. Irwin are not clear to me. But I was contacted by CW4 Rick Bebb by email referencing a request for parts for the Yano. This was sometime in early 2003 and the first time I knew it was now in Barstow at the Dagget Airport. Through Mr. Bebb I met Bill Heidner and he was working and assisting in restoring the Yano. I made a trip to Barstow and Fort Irwin in late April 2003 to meet Bill and Rick as well as see 528. I also met Neil Morrison at the Museum while I was there. The restoration project seemed to slow due to some internal funding and personnel issues. Rick Bebb and Bill Heidner were transferred and so I again lost contact with the project.

On June 8, 2007 I received an email copy from Gary Roush. In this email he was explaining some of these events to Sherri Bratt and he gave her my email address. Sherri and I corresponded by email and I gave her information about 528 back in the day, Air Cav Troop, 11th ACR, RVN, 1967 -1968. I had planned to meet her when I made my visit to Fort Irwin in July 2007. She was on leave, however, when I arrived and so Neil Morrison, Museum Director, met with me and gave me a personal and much appreciated tour of 528 and the 11th ACR Museum

As I have indicated 528, The Yano, was not discovered by unnamed retired 11th ACR Vets at an unnamed private museum in New York. It is unfortunate that I was unable to meet with Sherri Bratt as I would have been able to relate to her the true recovery story of this famous UH-1C Gun Ship. My reason for this article is to give the accurate story of recovery and credit to myself and to those who were instrumental in saving 528, the Yano. Those people are: Rick Douglas, Mike Thompson, Gary Roush, Brian Howard, Rick Bebb, Bill Heidner, and Neil Morrison.

The Yano is currently a work in progress, we are not done with her yet.

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

• Operation Thunder Dragon. In late May 1967, Second Squadron was operating outside of Chu Lai in I Corps Tactical Zone, not far south of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) with North Vietnam. The squadron was part of Task Force Oregon and working directly with the 196th Light Infantry Brigade. On the last day of Operation Thunder Dragon, Fox Troop got into a big fight. The following is a description from the 2/11 After Action Report. "Three days later [25 May] a forward fire base came under an unexpected mortar attack. Sergeant Wendle C. Davis, a mortarman with F Troop, left his position of safety inside an armored personnel carrier and rushed through the incoming mortar fire to his own mortar position. He immediately began to fire rounds toward suspected enemy positions. Sergeant Davis' exceptional example spurred other mortarmen to join him. Upon ascertaining that he had a well-organized crew returning fire, Sergeant Davis ran across an open area to man a caliber 50 machinegun with which to place fire against enemy small arms positions that were supplementing the enemy mortar fire. In the process he was mortally wounded. Captain Donald A. Burns, commanding F Troop, received word of the enemy attack on the fire base and rushed his force to the scene of the battle. Once in the battle area, Captain Burns stood on top of his personnel carrier in order to direct his forces against the enemy. Destroying the enemy forces closest to the beleaguered camp, F Troop continued the attack to destroy any enemy forces still remaining in the area. Nearing the base of a hill not far from the small American camp, F Troop once again came under heavy enemy fire. Without delay Captain Burns deployed his troop and routed the enemy. During the battle Captain Burns continually exposed himself to enemy fire in order to call in artillery and rally his troops. His daring effort was an example to his men and contributed substantially to the success of the mission. Captain Burns and Sergeant Davis were awarded the Silver Star for this action which resulted in thirty-five enemy soldiers killed."

• **Hey Nguyen, got a light?** Between late December 1967 and mid-January 1968, First and Second Squadrons conducted search and destroy operations along Highway 13 between Loc Ninh and the Cambodian border. The operation was designed to open Thunder Road for military traffic for the first time since the French were in charge in the early 1950s, as well as to locate VC and NVA units that were suspected of infiltrating across from Cambodia southwards toward Saigon. In mid-January, Alpha Troop came across an intricate enemy base camp supply complex. The base had obviously been hastily evacuated, as the

Troopers found wet laundry hanging on the line and a just-used toothbrush in a cup. Cards wishing the guerrillas a 'Happy Tet' from Uncle Ho Chi Minh were found throughout the above-ground structures hidden in the dense jungle. Bags of rice, estimated as enough to feed a VC company for three days, were stored inside the camp. Most interesting of all, however, was a cache of cigarette lighters – one for each man in Alpha Troop.

• Blackhorse Spiderman. First Lieutenant James Palmer known as Spider Man to his buddies - was brand new to the Regiment and Air Cavalry Troop. In fact, he arrived just at the height of the Tet '68 offensive. With only about a week in the unit, he was becoming familiarized with Lai Khe and how Air Cavalry Troop operated. His orientation was rudely interrupted, however, when, on the night of 8 February 1968, the airfield at Lai Khe came under attack, damaging eight Blackhorse aircraft and a ³/₄-ton truck. The damage would have been higher but for Spiderman's quick actions, as described in his Air Medal with 'V' device for valor citation: "On this date in the vicinity of Lai Khe, Lieutenant Palmer was notified that an enemy rocket had struck the main communications point and that the resulting fire and secondary explosions were endangering the aircraft of his unit. Upon reaching the area of the aircraft, he observed an unarmed UH-1C [Huey gunship] helicopter that was in extreme danger of being destroyed. Reacting instantly, he dashed through the flying debris to man the aircraft and although he had never flown an aircraft of this type, Lieutenant Palmer successfully flew the helicopter from the area of the fire and landed it one half mile away. Due to his instant reactions, the helicopter received only slight damage."

• Fiddlers Green. New York-born Staff Sergeant Robert Meeker joined the Blackhorse on September 7th, 1968, two years and one day after the Regiment arrived in Vietnam. A graduate of Fort Benning's 'Shake and Bake' NCO Class 25-68 in June, he was assigned as a scout section leader in Lima Troop, 3/11. In the span of the six months that Sergeant Meeker was with the Blackhorse, he earned two Silver Stars. In February 1969, Lima Troop moved with the rest of 3/11 to Fire Support Base Holiday Inn to work with the 1st (US) Infantry Division and the 5th (ARVN) Infantry Division. Sergeant Meeker and his platoon were on a routine reconnaissance on February 18th when the armored column was suddenly hit by automatic weapons and antitank grenade fire. His Silver Star citation continues: "In the initial burst of fire. Sergeant Meeker's vehicle sustained a direct hit from a rocket propelled grenade round, knocking him from the vehicle and severely wounding him. Although wounded and dazed, he remounted his vehicle and began directing accurate and deadly machinegun fire upon the hostile elements. While engaging the enemy forces from his vehicle, he was again hit by enemy small arms fire... Suddenly his vehicle received another direct hit from an enemy rocket propelled grenade round, wounding his entire crew and causing the vehicle to erupt into flames. Yet, he continued to shower the enemy positions with machinegun fire, pinning the hostile elements down long enough to allow the evacuation of his wounded comrades. For a third time his vehicle was hit by a rocket propelled grenade round, again knocking him to the ground. In spite of his severe wounds, he refused medical attention until his wounded comrades had been attended to." Robert Meeker succumbed to his wounds that day, but his actions guaranteed him a hallowed place in Fiddlers Green.

• From Chicago to Quan Loi. From the February 1970 edition of the *Blackhorse* newspaper: "A pair of official Chicago street signs which read '43rd Street' and 'Union Avenue' have been

posted above the red soil of Quan Loi. The signs, which ordinarily stand amid multi-family dwellings, sidewalks, automobiles and the gray smog of Chicago, are surrounded by 12-man tents, unpaved track-torn roads, battle-scarred armored vehicles and a permanent haze of red dust. Specialist Five Bernard L. Malnarick of 4211 S. Union St., Chicago said the signs were a gift from a fellow Chicagoan, Mayor Richard J. Daley, who had the signs produced in the city's sign shop at his request. Malnarick explained that the display not only reminds him of 'life back on the block,' but also gives him a fixed point to call home as his unit, the 919th Engineer Company, moves throughout III Corps. Malnarick, a tanker gunner, received the gift while the engineers were busting jungle dangerously close to the Cambodian border. Displaying the bright yellow signs on the tank turret didn't seem tactically sound, so he deferred the official unveiling until he returned to Quan Loi. A Chicago City Flag, also a gift from the Mayor, brightens the inside of Malnarick's drab tent."
