Women’s Group Award



Our Scholarship Program continued to set records for fundraising and number of scholarship grants awarded. Poindexter.

The highlight will be the rededication of our Memorial that stands in the Memorial Garden on the grounds of the Patton Museum at Fort Knox. Editor's Corner

Back in the year 2000 I wrote these published words, "Former Secretary of State Dean Rusk, national security advisor Walt Rostow, and Prime Minister of Singapore Lee Kuan Yew, commenting on whether the high costs of the Vietnam War were justified, gave an answer in the affirmative. Dean Rusk, Walt Rostow, Lee Kuan Yew, and many other geopoliticians across the globe to this day answer yes. They conclude that without U.S. intervention in Vietnam, Communist hegemony—both Soviet and Chinese—would have spread farther through South and East Asia to include Indonesia, Thailand, and possibly India." I was wearing my white Blackhorse T-shirt with full color BH insignia and Vietnam Ribbon and casually walked over to the diorama and approached the man. The man's 10 year old son was with him and when this man saw me he asked me if I was a Vietnam Veteran. After I said yes he turned to his son and instructed him "Say thank you to this man, he helped you have the freedom you have in our country." He then said to me, "Your action in Vietnam gave us a 10 year cushion to ward off communist insurgency in our country."

I was confused at first as I thought he might be Vietnamese but his message didn't exactly jibe with the denouement of the Vietnam War that we as veterans of that conflict recollect. I asked him if he was Vietnamese and he said no, that he was a citizen of Singapore and he still was a Sergeant in Singapore's army and his active service had been on an M-113. I explained to him that I too had served on an M-113 and explained to him how we modified it into an ACAV. He stated

that his vehicle had been modified exactly the same way.

We had a great conversation for an hour or so and during the conversation he reiterated what he had said earlier about our contribution to staving off communist totalitarianism in his country. He emphasized that they emphatically taught in their schools that the United States effort in Vietnam contributed greatly to the present freedom in their country.

I was ecstatic hearing this personal, unsolicited testimony to what I had written earlier and had believed myself. I am also overjoyed to relate it to all of you because it applies to you as well. Take heart! I believe his words were a gift to me and I pass this gift on to all of you who so richly deserve it as well. ALLONS BROTHERS!

I am really sorry I wasn't able to attend the Reunion this year. By all accounts it was great (aren't they all?). I hope the first timers will make it a habit. It sure would be great if some way, somehow all Blackhorse Troopers would get to a reunion.

The first leg of our 2007 Scholarship fundraising effort will be in your mailboxes around Thanksgiving. The 2007 11thACVVC Calendar will once again feature 12 new photos submitted by you! I want to thank all who have sent photos for consideration and apologize to those who I have failed to follow-up on in returning the photos you sent in the past. I am going to screen all the pictures you have sent to see if they can be used in this year's edition. After that final screen, I will return all photos I have received that you requested I return.

I once again appeal to your **This year, the goal will be \$35,000!** generosity as we ask for donations to support our Scholarship Program. Without your support the program would not be viable.

Remember—we are not "selling" calendars. The calendar you receive is yours to keep and use whether you donate or not. We do however solicit your support with the most generous tax-deductible donation that you can make to assist the children of the 11thACVVC members begin or continue their post-secondary education. The scholarships can be used for college, trade school, or any other educational training following high school. Last year, however, the Officers and Directors voted to no longer award Graduate Students in pursuit of additional degrees after successful completing college. The reason for the limitation is to assist more of our high school graduates on the way to furthering their education.

Last year we set a goal of \$30,000 in donations in support of the Calendar project. You generously contributed over \$32,000! This year, the goal will be \$35,000! We will need your help in attaining that unprecedented level! Many of you have decided to submit \$100 to \$500 for this cause—we need you to continue your ardent support and to add more to your rolls. Last year we awarded 27 of our children scholarship grants of \$3,000 each for a total of \$81,000 in assistance. We attained that level with only about 20% of our members making donations. If we can get just half of you to participate, we could award assistance to every qualified applicant!! *Thank you in advance for your generous support!!*

Additional thanks are due our ever-faithful Chaplain. Larry conducted an outstanding Memorial Service Saturday afternoon at the famed Liberty Memorial across from historic Union Station. We found out that the site on the top of a small hill proved difficult for some to get to, and we learned a lesson to better prepare for wheel chair and other handicap access in the future. To those who were inconvenienced, we sincerely apologize, and for those who assisted their "Brothers" and families, THANK YOU!

As always, the highlight of the weekend was the gala Saturday night banquet. This year was extra exciting and took on special meaning because of an awards ceremony probably unprecedented in recent Army annals. Eight brave and gallant Troopers from A Troop received awards (two posthumous) for courage and fortitude while engaged in battle against a superior enemy force in late March 1970. John B. Poindexter (A Troop, '70-'71), who was the Troop Commander at the time, had spent the better part of three years compiling data to ensure these deserving Troopers were recognized for their heroic deeds.

Thanks to his dedicated pursuit the belat-

ed awards were finally presented. John was the featured speaker and prior to the awards presentation gave an outstanding multimedia rendition of parts of the action, which he dubbed "The Anonymous Battle". (The action is detailed in a book by the same title available through the QM Store.) MG Guy C. Swan III, the 57th Colonel of the Regiment, graciously agreed to present medals to the Trooper and family members for the posthumous awards. Two Silver Star awards, three Bronze Star w/"V" Device, and four Soldier's Medals were proudly pinned and offered to the Troopers and families.

Awardees were: 1st LT Robert Henderson (Posthumous)—Silver Star; SGT Donnie Colwell—Silver Star and Soldier's Medal; SGT Dennis Jabbusch, SP4 Angel Pagan, and, SP4 Brian Cupp—Bronze Stars w/"V" Device; SGT Ronald Vaughan, SP5 Walter Andrews (Posthumous), and, SP5 Craig Wright—Soldier's Medals. Congratulations to all awardees and their families. Their sacrifices and outstanding bravery reflects great credit on themselves, their unit, and the United States Army!

There were other activities such as the Veterans Seminar on Friday afternoon, the Bunker Party Friday night, individual sight-seeing trips, the Silent Auction Friday and Saturday evenings, the QM Store, and numerous mini-reunions and long lost "First

Timers" once more greeting their comrades-in-arms after more than 30 years apart. In the past few months the membership committee has made some significant gains. A complete report was presented at the membership meeting during the reunion. We also wanted to report some of the highlights to all members receiving this newsletter.

The most significant gain is the 528 new LIFE members since the 2005 reunion. Approximately 70 percent of our members are LIFE members.

We would also like to welcome the 275 new members who have joined the 11th ACVVC during the last three months. This is the highest number of new members in several years.

Since January 2006, we have located over 1,800 Blackhorse troopers, all who served in Vietnam. Nearly 1,100 have been located in the last three months. We pride ourselves on our continued commitment to bring the news to our members through this newsletter which has been printed and mailed every quarter for the past 20 years.

OPERATION EMBRACE

Situation:

At the 2007 Reunion in Louisville, KY, the 11th ACVVC intends on rededicating the 11th Cavalry's Memorial honoring 11th ACR troopers Killed In Action in the Republic of Vietnam. At this service the 11th ACVVC will also dedicate memorials honoring 11th ACR troopers killed in the Philippine Insurrection, World War II, The Gulf War, and Iraqi Freedom.

Mission:

1) Identify and make contact with as many surviving family members (Next of Kin (NOK) of KIA's from all conflicts. Inform the NOK of the planned service and extend invitations to all NOK to attend both the reunion and service.

2) Develop and execute a fundraising program specifically for this initiative. Fundraising proceeds will be used to defray the travel expenses of needy NOK and members attending the reunion and service. (NOTE: Fundraising for this Operation falls within the scope of what the IRS considers consistent with the requirements for a 501 (c) (19) organization; specifically in that this Operation perpetuates the memory of veterans and is intended to provide comfort to their survivors.)

Execution:**A) Concept:**

Using organic and inorganic assets the 11th ACVVC will mount a national campaign to locate the NOK of 11th ACR troopers KIA in all conflicts in which the 11th ACR participated. NOK located will be informed of the memorial service planned for the 2007 reunion in Louisville, specifically of planned rededicate the 11th ACR Memorial and the intention to dedicate memorials for those troopers killed in all other conflicts in which the Regiment participated. NOK located will be invited to attend both the reunion and memorial service. Generation of personal information regarding our Vietnam KIAs to be displayed in the planned museum to be built next to the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C. will be a by-product of this initiative. If practical, concurrent with the search for NOK, the 11th ACVVC will conduct a fundraising operation the proceeds of which are intended to provide financial assistance to NOK and troopers requiring financial aid to attend the reunion.

B: Tasks:**a: President:**

i: Inform the Regiment and Blackhorse Association of this initiative and request their assistance in providing any NOK information they might have.

I: Draft a letter to be sent to NOK informing them of and inviting them to the memorial service.

b: Legal Counsel:

i: Review fundraising requirements and offer an opinion regarding the feasibility of engaging in a nationwide fundraising program intended to solicit funds from non-members. (<http://www.multistatefiling.org/index.html>)

ii: If a nationwide fundraising program is approved, draft a

fundraising letter ensuring it conforms to IRS requirements.

iii: If a nationwide fundraising program is not approved, opine on the legality of inserting language similar to, "For more information, or to make a contribution to this cause..." on any press release, correspondence regarding the initiative, and on the website.

c: Membership Chairman:

i: Provide any NOK information available the coordinator.

ii: The Chairman and coordinator will decide on the format of a master roster. The coordinator will provide updates of the master roster as requested by the Chairman or as mutually agreed to by the Chairman and coordinator.

d: Historian:

i: Provide any NOK information available the coordinator

ii: Provide the coordinator with guidance in respect to potential sources of information.

e: PAO/PIO:

i: Prepare and execute a national media campaign informing the public about this initiative and directing them to the website and/or 11th ACVVC mailing address for more information.

ii: Prepare a common press release that members can submit to their local media outlets.

f: Webmaster:

i: Using graphics shown at the Kansas City reunion, create a page permitting visitors to the website to view the conceptualized memorials.

ii: Include in that page a copy of the President's letter regarding the initiative.

iii: Include a donate now button on that page.

iv: Create a sub-forum in the Members Only Forum for this topic.

v: Reference the following email address: 11thACRKIA@gmail.com

vi: If possible, generate an E-Newsletter to members with registered email addresses informing them of the initiative and requesting they forward any NOK information they may have.

g: Project Coordinator:

i: Coordinate the actions of all officers and members participating in this initiative.

ii: Identify and access databases and archives that may contain NOK information.

iii: Monitor the 11th ACVVC website bulletin board for messages from NOK or from members reflecting some knowledge of a NOK.

iv: Prepare a master roster of NOK for submission to the Membership Chairman.

v: Prepare a report for the President, officers, and members.

It's The Kids

During the years of the Viet Nam War, one of the things that stood out the most was the love of our soldiers for the Vietnamese children. It's too bad but many Americans, even to this day, believed that their own soldiers enjoyed shooting women and children. These were their own sons we're talking about. Since the main stream media ignored how their soldiers really related to the Vietnamese children and much of the information coming out of the entertainment industry defamed our sons in uniform, it's no wonder people were so profoundly and negatively informed. Consider the movie *Born on the Fourth of July*, which is a typical example. That movie portrayed our troopers as being almost uniformly baby killers. In recent years Viet Nam vets have frequently been invited into school classrooms to tell their experiences in order to give students a first hand insight into that period of our history. When open for questions to the vet, very commonly the first two questions are, "How many people did you kill?" and, "How many babies did you kill?" It is so tragic that even our own children have this twisted perception because the exact opposite happens to be the truth (with rare exceptions).

I, personally, with virtually all Viet Nam vets, remember clearly how children would run up to them, even out in the jungle villages as well as the larger towns, so they could hold the hands of the GIs, have their picture taken with them and, of course, receive more candy and gum than was really good for their health. I was one of many chaplains, officers, NCOs, and soldiers who supported orphanages, children's homes and schools, hospitals, and even leprosariums which commonly housed whole families. Indeed, with few exceptions, the children of Viet Nam truly loved American soldiers. I could talk on about soldiers risking, or even sacrificing, their very lives for the sake of the kids. I could talk from first hand about how the enemy used kids as shields while they shot at the Americans because they knew the Americans did not want to shoot back, and

would only do so under the most extreme combat situations. (If you doubt what I'm saying, then you just weren't there and you don't know. So please keep an open mind).

"So what," you say? "What does that have to do with anything? The Viet Nam War was over a long time ago." My response is two-fold: Number one, I've learned from many personal observations, reports from friends who visit Viet Nam, and from other reliable sources, that the Vietnamese people today, as we speak, truly love and highly regard the American people. This is particularly true for Viet Nam vets who once fought on their soil. It's common knowledge that well over half of the Vietnamese people today weren't even born until after the conclusion of that war. Yet even these young people show a strong regard for Americans. If you doubt what I say, I suggest you go over there as a tourist, which is easy to do, and find out for yourself. Many of my personal friends and associates do just that. Many of these are Viet Nam vets. So it is my opinion that, even though Viet Nam today is still a highly regimented society run by a highly oppressive government, the people have many benefits, liberties, and personal aspirations which they could not possibly experience had it not been for the selfless role of the American soldier on behalf of them and their children (who are now mature adults).

My number two response to the "so what?" question is this: Through news sources, internet email from soldiers in Iraq, personal relationships with many soldiers returning from Iraq, and other reliable sources, it is clear that much of the Viet Nam experience is being repeated now with our young uniformed men and women in Iraq. Soldiers are swarmed by kids when they go on patrol and when they visit the civilian community.

Whenever the children can get to a GI, they do. Sure, they get their candy, just like the old days of Viet Nam. But kids still love American soldiers, want to be around them, and clearly understand that American soldiers love them too. For their own reasons the media vastly overplays the ugly, however true, aspects of the war in Iraq, which is shame on them. In similar proportion, they downplay the beautiful, yes beautiful, relationships and bonding that forms between our sons and daughters, and our grandsons and granddaughters in uniform, with the children they are fighting for. They are committed so these kids can aspire to a life better than anything they've known so far.

A further and profound reality that I predict, is that twenty, thirty, forty years from now and after the final battle of Iraqi Freedom, the children will be grown, the country will be more stable (hopefully, much more stable), and the people will have strong memories of and even bonds with those troopers who fought to give them opportunity to make a new life and gain a new hope for themselves.

So are we seeing history repeat itself? Yes, we are. Are we learning from these lessons of history? It's too early to tell. Are the Vietnamese people better off because our soldiers walked there? Overall, yes they are - just go and see for yourself. Are they as well off as they would be if things had been handled better? Of course not. So let's learn from that experience and do better with the Iraqis. At least let's recognize that our soldiers, both men and women this time, are our kids and grandkids. They love the Iraqi kids and the Iraqi kids love them. So whatever our politics of the war, it is clear that this relationship between the younger generations will benefit us all for a long time to come - from both the American and the Iraqi points of view.

I'll close with one more thought about children. I'm sure we all agree with the obvious, that children are our future. How a nation's children turn out will determine the course and character of that country, whether Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan or any other. We should be proud and honored that this generation of men and women in uniform have such a love for children, wherever they are. Personally, I believe these values come from our Judeo-Christian heritage of a strong regard for human life, especially the lives of innocents such as children. Whether or not you are Christian or even religious in your orientation, I believe it's valuable to be reminded of what Jesus had to say about how important children are. He said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." (Mark 10:14-15 NIV).

I'm so proud that our men and women in the uniform of our great land have such a profound love for kids around the world, especially in war time. I'm honored to have served in Viet Nam where I could observe and be a part of the love shown by our soldiers in that place and time. I'm so proud of our young generation serving now in the same tradition of caring for the kids, even in the difficult circumstance of war, whether Iraq or any other hot spot around the world.

I know you're proud too.

God bless you. God loves you. So do I.

The Lindjord Project – Renal Cell Carcinoma

Norman Lindjord served as a Lieutenant with the 3rd Squadron, 11th ACR in 1970 as a Forward Observer and as Fire Direction Officer. A great guy, he was well-liked by all, the officers, NCOs and the enlisted men. He was fastidiously neat and his reputation earned him the nickname "Hazel" (after the TV show starring Shirley Booth as a maid).

I had tried to keep in touch with Norm over the years and occasionally we exchanged cards and phone calls, but Norm was from Edmonds, Washington and I was from the East Coast, so we had little opportunity to meet again in person. In 2003, Norm and Dave Coover, (XO of the 3rd Squadron's Howitzer Battery, from Texas) attended the 11th ACVVC Reunion in Eugene, Oregon.

We spent a great night drinking beer and rehashing the same stupid stories – and a few new ones – that we had lived over thirty-five years ago. Norm also had some serious issues to discuss. He had had surgery to remove tumors on a kidney and his follow-up research disclosed that there were many other Blackhorse Troopers who had experienced similar problems. Norm conversed at length with many of these men; the first he communicated with was Tom Litney who had written a short note in Thunder Run about kidney cancer (Renal Cell Carcinoma or RCC) some years back. Tom died from RCC.

On February 6, 2005, Norm "Hazel" Lindjord died from cancer that started as Renal Cell Carcinoma.

I had been in contact with Norm and

Dave more frequently since 2003 and when I learned Norm was terminally ill, I decided to visit him, as did Jerry Trainor (from WI), Leo Regala (from Tacoma, WA) and Dave, (from TX). I didn't get there in time.....


I flew to Washington for the Memorial Service and was warmly welcomed by the Lindjord family. Norm's parents, Hal and Mary, are two of the most intelligent and gracious people I have ever met. I was reunited for the first time in 35 years with Jerry Trainor and Leo Regala. Dave Coover flew in from Texas for the Memorial service. Also in attendance was Harold "Bo" Mann, (Edmonds, WA).

Hal and Mary gave me Norm's medical files in the hopes that perhaps I could do some follow up work for Norm. According to the information in his records, seven of the nine men he had been in contact with have already passed away from RCC.

My goal is to gather as much data as possible from Blackhorse Troopers who served in Vietnam and Cambodia and who have been diagnosed with Renal Cell Carcinoma. If successful, I would like to present this data to the Veterans Administration. Ideally, together we may be able to convince the VA that RCC can be linked to exposure to Agent Orange. To accomplish this goal I need your help. If you have been diagnosed with RCC or know another Trooper who has been, please contact me directly.

Memorial Restoration and Rededication

After a long three-year research project by Allen Hathaway (assisted by a few others, namely John Effinger, L Troop 67-68 and John Sorich, A Troop, 69-70) we are finally prepared to correct errors on our monument in the Memorial Garden at the Patton Museum, Fort Knox, KY. The monument will be rededicated on Saturday, 8 September 2007 during the Memorial Service we will conduct for our XXII Annual Reunion. The reunion hotel is The Galt House in Louisville, and you can find information on the hotel in this issue of the "Thunder Run".

To correct errors, the four bronze plaques listing our Brothers who lost their lives in Vietnam and Cambodia will be removed and replaced. The new plaques, in addition to finally having correct data, will be changed listing our KIA's by Squadron, Troop or Company, and Detachment. This will assist in locating the names of lost comrades. Names are currently listed chronologically around the monument with no Troop designation. We found a number of misspellings, missing names, and names of soldiers who never served in the Regiment. All these errors will be corrected.

In addition, the top of the monument will be restored to its original condition and design configuration that it had when

constructed and placed in front of the Regimental Chapel in Blackhorse base camp in Xuan Loc. Sometime over the years, there was a repair made to the top of the monument resulting in an unsightly concrete cap versus the original bronze dome configuration.

Expenditure of 11thACVVC funds for this project was approved by the membership attending the Annual Business Meeting on 23 September 2006 during the XXI Reunion in Kansas City, MO. The membership also endorsed, by unanimous vote, a proposal to include on the monument site three obelisks to mark the other wars and campaigns that the 11th Cavalry has conducted since its activation more than 105 years ago. One will mark our participation in the Philippine Insurrection and the Mexican Expedition; another WWII, and finally, one will be placed to honor our participation in Operation Desert Storm and Operation Iraqi Freedom III. Each will stand about four feet high and will list the names of our Fellow Troopers who lost their lives in those wars. (See the artist's rendering on page with brick order form)

In conjunction with this effort, we are proposing to establish a "Circle of Honor" as a way to raise funds to offset the cost of the additions to the monument site. This will consist of 8 x 4 x 2 inch granite pavers that can be inscribed with



Once the Circle of Honor is in place, unclaimed pavers may still be available, however the required donation will then be \$125 due to additional costs of engraving on site.

The addition of the three obelisks and the "Circle of Honor" is pending approval by the Board of Directors of the Patton Museum, so all donations collected for the pavers will be held in escrow until approval is granted. In the unlikely event that the project is not approved, all donations will be refunded.

h: General Membership:

i: Some-to many of our members have already established contact with NOK. Through our newsletter, the website, emails, and if necessary a separate mailing, the membership will be requested to provide any NOK information they may have to the coordinator of this operation.

ii: Volunteers representing both troop/company affiliation and geographical considerations will be solicited from the membership. They will assist by:

- 1: Researching archived obituaries of local newspapers.
2. Contacting cemetery management to either obtain point of contact information (POC) for gravesites (hopefully a NOK) or request the manager to contact and inform the POC of our interest in contacting them.
3. Contacting local veteran organizations for assistance in locating NOK.
4. Contacting local churches, synagogues, and other places of worship for assistance.
5. Contacting local authorities for assistance

i: Fundraising:

1. If the Board approves, a fundraising committee will be established, strategy formulated, presented to the Board for review, and if approved implemented.

Support:

A) At a minimum, funding requirements for this initiative will include stationary and postage expenses for mailing letters to NOK not previously identified.

B) Commercial search services may have to be employed to locate NOK. The cost per report (search) is approximately \$25.00. Use of these services will be a last resort effort, following a review by the Officers of the 11th ACVVC of the action taken to locate the NOK and only when that review suggests the

search might be productive.

A: This initiative will be conducted under the auspices of the 11th ACVVC and overall direction of the President of the 11thACVVC.






I am happy to report that we are now fully engaged as a dual missioned unit for our Army:

1) Preparing and Training to fight as a Heavy Regimental Combat Team to defeat the enemies of our Nation

2) Setting the conditions for our Army to train for war here at the National Training Center.


As I sit down to write this update 1/11 ACR is preparing for a deployment to Fort Stewart to support the training of a Brigade Combat Team from the 3rd Infantry Division, 2/11 is engaged in the early stages of a four week gunnery cycle that will take them from crew/squad live fire qualification to a platoon combined arms live fire event in the northern training area of the National Training Center, 1-221 CAV is preparing for a Squadron change of command and a conversion to become the Regiment's Armored Reconnaissance Squadron and finally the Regimental Support Squadron, in addition to supporting the Regimental operations is gearing up for

marksmanship and convoy live fire exercises. It sure is great to be back in the CAV where you are never bored 'cause there is always somebody shootin' at something somewhere.

The past month has been a time of change in leadership across the Regiment. LTC Tim Renshaw took 1/11 and LTC Chuck Hensley 2/11 in June, and LTC Brent Barnes took the Regimental Support Squadron the last week of August. 10 September will be the last major change of command in the Regiment for at least the next two years as LTC Johnny Isaak turns over command of 1-221 CAV to Scott Cunningham in Las Vegas.

The changes in the Regiment will continue over the next few years as we transition from our old OPFOR configuration to a Heavy Regimental Combat Team and get in line with the other heavy brigades (HBCTs) in the Army. 1/11 and 2/11 will remain as Combined Arms Battalions with a lethal balance of Armor and Infantry Troops, but 1-221 CAV will transform from a tank battalion structure to a Bradley/HMMWV based Reconnaissance Squadron.






